

I. PROFILE OF THE MUNICIPALITY

VISION

By 2040, Oton, a commerce and trade center of Southern Iloilo, where people are God-loving, healthy, modest and empowered, living in an ecologically-balanced, disaster-resilient and safe community, promoting heritage preservation through inclusive, fair, transparent and technologically smart governance.

MISSION

Effective and efficient delivery of basic services, utilizing modern technology with active participation of empowered stakeholders for transparent governance.

I. History

The town of Oton derived its name from three popular theories. Many people believe that Oton is a hispanized version of the phrase "ogtong adlaw", which means noontime. According to the story, the native gave this phrase when they were asked by the Spanish exporters as to the time of the day. Many people still refer to the town as Ogtong. Another theory is that the name of the town comes from the name of a fish, "kogtong", a very abundant kind during those days. The third is that Oton's name comes from a plant abundant in the river's estuary. It was the decayed stalk of this plant that was deposited along the river banks, later forming the town's site. Oton was the first settlement established in Panay during the Spanish Period and which later became the seat of the Alcadia de Panay from 1572 to 1581. After the founding of Arevalo in 1581, the seat of the government was moved there, hence, Arevalo was the capital of the province from 1581 to 1688 while the province was then called Province de Iloilo. Much earlier, Oton was also an important Malay capital. Under Datu Paiburong, the seat of the government was Katagman (now, Brgy. San Antonio) until he died of old age in 226 A.D. Only then did the chieftainship was returned back to Aklan, that was when Balingsasa, Datu Bankaya's son became Paiburong's successor. The town prides itself as being the first in the Philippines where the temple dedicated to the Immaculate Concepcion of the Virgin Mary was built and where the Gospel was first preached.

Oton may be many a different thing to people- Oton is beaches, twelve kilometers from the city. It is a source of the famous hand-woven hablon, and source of Capiz shells. To the historians, Oton is the second settlement (next only to Cebu) discovered by Legaspi and his marauders. And today, it is coined to be the "dormitory" of Iloilo City- indeed, Oton is a place worthy to come home to.

II. GEO-PHYSICAL ENVIRONMENT

2.1 Geographical Location and Political Boundaries

The Municipality of Oton lies in the southern portion of the province. It is 10.2 kilometers from the City of Iloilo. It is bound on the east by the district of Arevalo; on the West by the municipality of Tigbauan; on the North by the municipality of San Miguel and on the southern portion by a stretch of shoreline of the Sulu Sea. It lies approximately 122 29'15" to 122 31'53" longitude and 10 42'23" to 10 43'50" latitude. Travel time from the city to the town proper is approximately 15-20 minutes by jeep or private cars. The total area of the municipality is 8,644 hectares as certified by the DENR for IRA purposes.

2.2 Topography

Oton varies from plain to rolling hills. The greatest part of the western portion of the municipality is a belt of hills and rolling lands. Lumanan River serves as the principal drain canal of water from the elevated portion to the hinterlands while five (5) creeks traverse the municipality emptying to the coastline. Slope of land is between 0-3% which provides a good picture for lowland crops.

2.3 Geology

Basically, like any other municipalities in the Province of Iloilo, Oton exhibits a very fertile type of soil. These soil types based on genetic and morphological characteristics are soil of the hills and mountains. Soils of the plain include the Sta. Rita and Beach Sand while the soils of the hills and mountains include Alimodian Clay Loam.

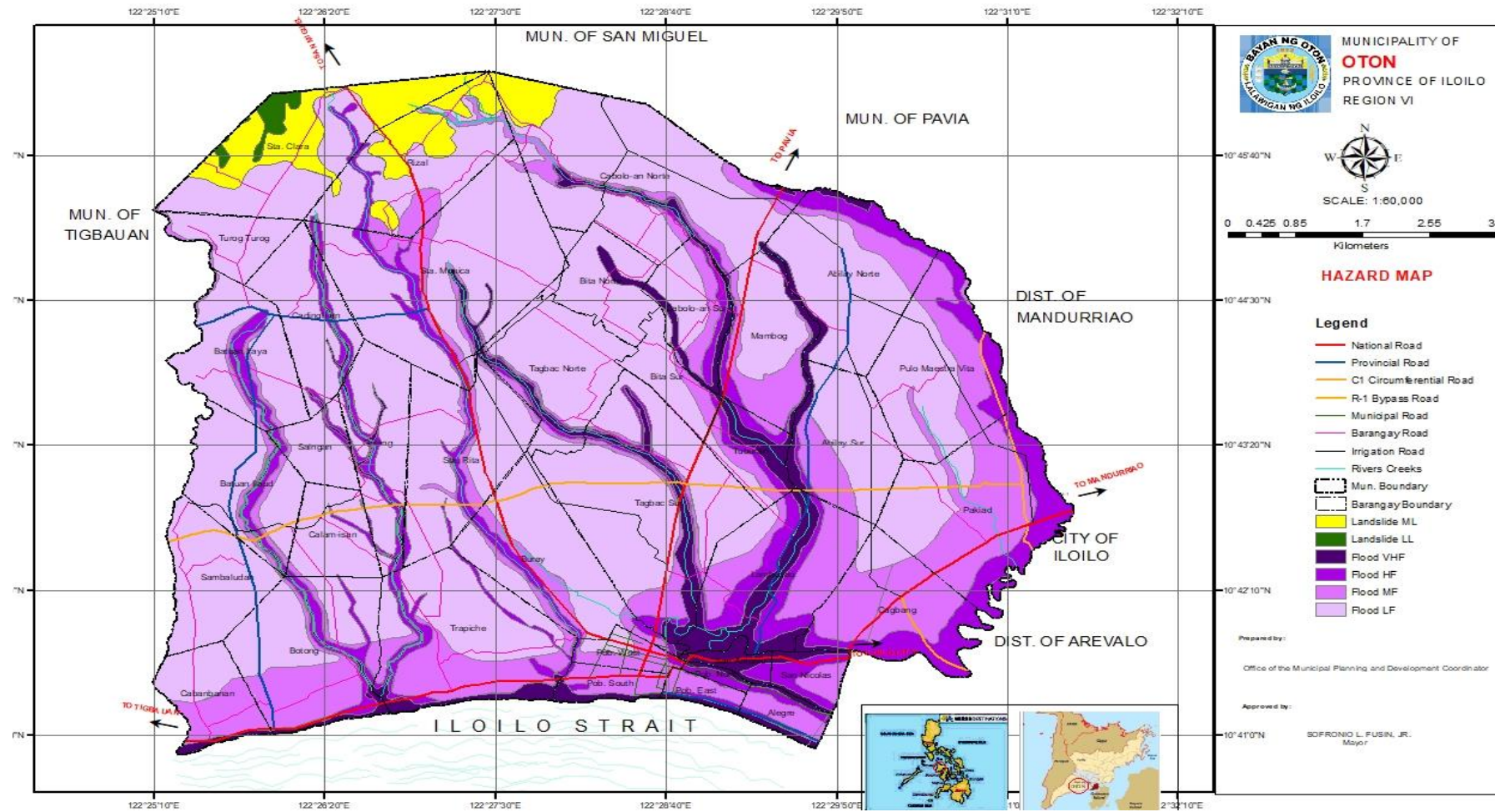

2.6 Climate

Like any other parts of Iloilo Province, Oton has pronounced climate. Dry months come in December to June, while rainy season come from July to November. It has a cooler climate during summer months due to the Sulu Sea breeze in its southern barangays. This type of climate is appropriate for lowland crops like palay, corn, sorghum, root crops and all other type of short-term crops. Since the southern portion faces a shoreline, this municipality is on the belt of any atmospheric disturbances in the air, like tornados, typhoon or any low-pressure storms.

III. POPULATION AND SOCIAL PROFILE

3.1 Social Composition and Characteristics

3.1.1 Total Population by Age Group, Sex, Urban-Rural

Based on the 2015 Census of Population and Housing reflected in **Table 5**, it shows that Oton has a total population of 89,115, comprising 44,588 males (50%) and 44,527 females (50%). By age group, 24,554 or 28% of the population were under 15 years old (young dependents). Of these, 12,690 were male and 11,864 were female. On the other hand, the 15–64 age group (working age or economically productive) comprises 65%, or 58,343 of the total population, wherein 29,439 were male and 28,904 were female. The remaining 7%, or 6,218 of the population are 65 years old and over (old dependents), comprising 2,459 males and 3,759 females. Meanwhile, the sex ratio for 2015 is 100. This means that there are 100 males for every 100 females.

Age Dependency Ratio

As reflected in **Table 5**, the 2015 Census Report shows that the young dependents (0–14) have a total population of 24,554, comprising 12,690 males (52%), and 11,864 females (48%). On the other hand, the old dependents (65 and over) have a total population of 6,218 with 2,459 males (40%) and 3,759 females (60%). Data shows that the young dependency ratio is 42.09, or 42 young dependents per 100 working-age population, while the old dependency ratio is 10.66, or 11 old dependents per 100 working-age population. This shows that the total dependency ratio is 52.74, or 53 dependents per 100 working-age people. Moreover, there are more male young dependents than females, while there are more female old dependents than males.

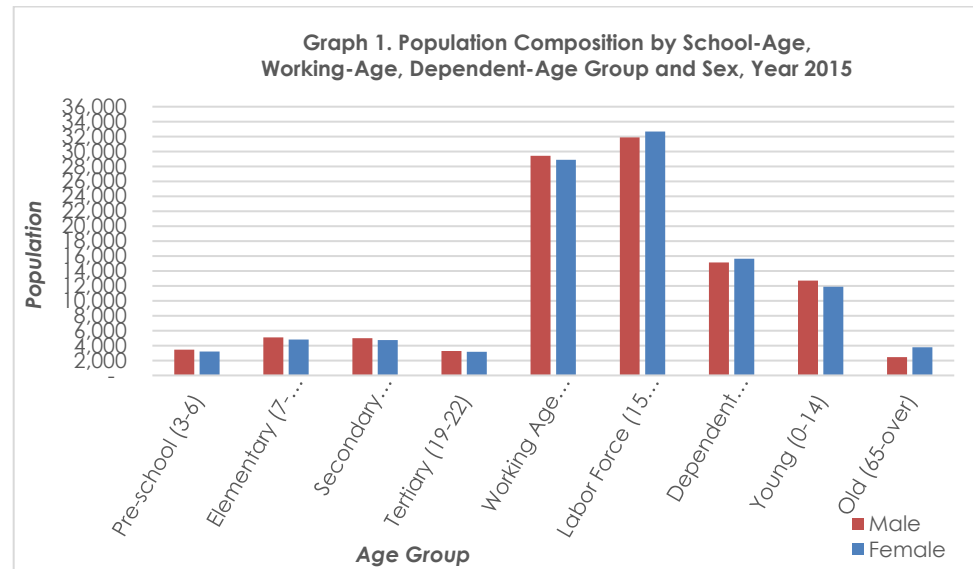
School-Age Population

As reflected in **Table 5**, the data shows that the school-age population (3–22 years old) accounted for 32,636 of the 89,115 total population. The elementary has the highest population of 9,892 comprising of 5,099 males (52%), and 4,793 females (49%), followed by the secondary with a population of 9,706 comprising of 4,985 males (51%), and 4,721 females (49%), the pre-school with a population of 6,615 comprising of 3,432 males (52%), and 3,182 females (48%), and the tertiary with a population of 6,423 comprising of 3,267 males (51%), and 3,156 females (49%).

As shown in **Graph 1**, the sex ratio for under 15 years old is 106 which means that there are 106 males for every 100 females. On the other hand, the sex ratio for 15-64 years old (working age) is 102. The sex ratio for 65 years old and over is 65.



3.1.2 POPULATION DISTRIBUTION

According to the 2015 Census of Population reflected in **Table 6**, data shows that Oton has a total household population of 88,988 consisting of 44,510 males (50%) and 44,478 females (50%). The 5-9 age group has the highest recorded population with 8,360 individuals consisting of 4,324 males and 4,036 females, while the 75-79 age group has the lowest population with 1,178 individuals consisting of 447 males and 731 females.

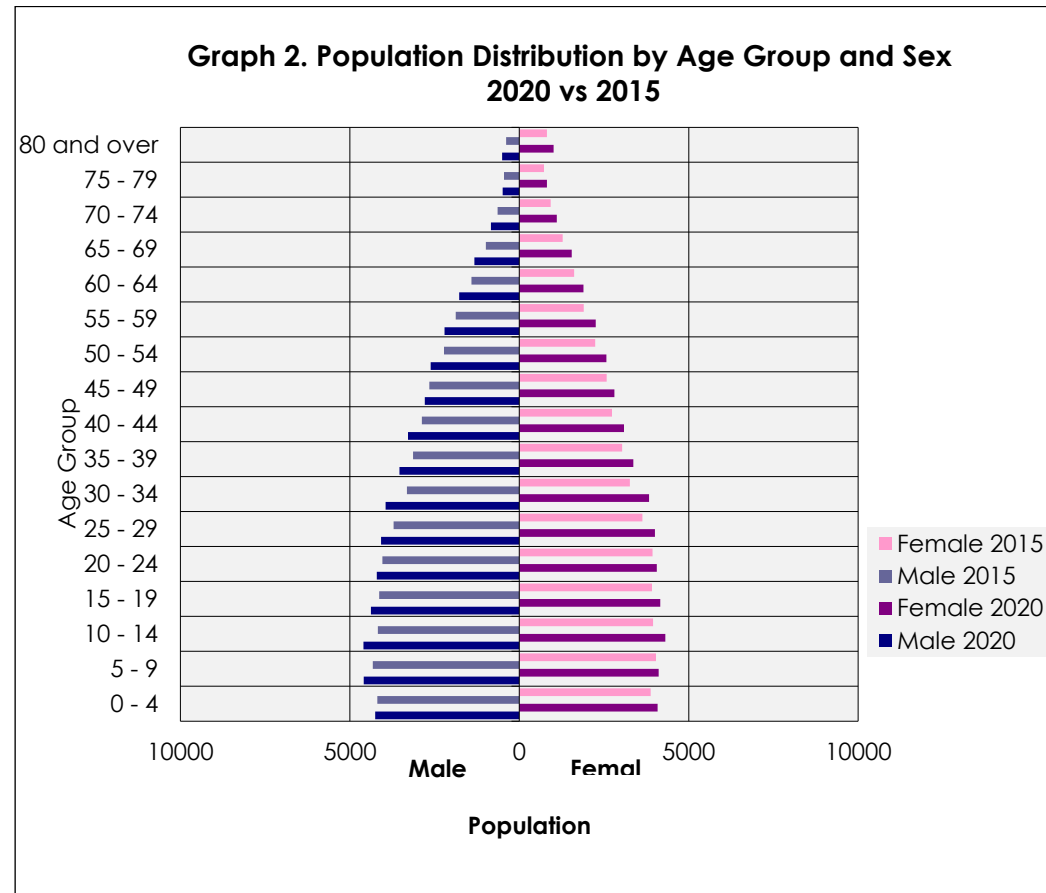
Meanwhile, the 2020 Census of Population and Housing shows the municipality’s household population of 98,437, comprising of 49,409 males (50%) and 49,028 females (50%). Based on the age group, the highest recorded household population belongs to 10-14 with a population of 8,906 consisting of 4,597 males and 4,309 females, while the lowest population belongs to 75-79 age group with 1,305 individuals consisting of 488 males and 817 females.

The population pyramid of Oton is represented by the expansive pyramid, which is generally the type of pyramid in the age-sex composition of the Philippine population. **Graph 2** shows that the population pyramid for 2015 and 2020 has a broad base, which means that a large proportion of the population belongs to the young age group. Those below 15 years old constitute 26% of the population, while those 65 years old and over comprise 8% of the population. The graph also illustrates that the male and female populations for 2015 and 2020 were equally divided.



3.1.3 Urban and Rural Household Population

Oton is composed of 37 barangays, with nine urban barangays and twenty-eight rural barangays. As shown in **Table 7**, data from the 2020 Census of Population and Housing shows that 52% of the total population, or 51,069 individuals, resided in the rural barangays, while the remaining 48%, or 47,440 individuals, resided in the urban barangays.

The municipality is composed of 24,583 households, of which 12,695 are in the rural barangays and 11,888 are in the urban areas. The average household size for urban areas is 3.99, while in rural areas it is 4.02.

The top five most populous barangays include the following: Brgy. Abilay Norte with a population of 8,963; Brgy. Buray with a population of 6,727; Brgy. Trapiche with a population of 6,490; Brgy. Cagbang with a population of 5,854; and Brgy. Poblacion South with a population of 5,481. On the other hand, the least populous barangay is Brgy. Bitá Sur, with 550 residents.

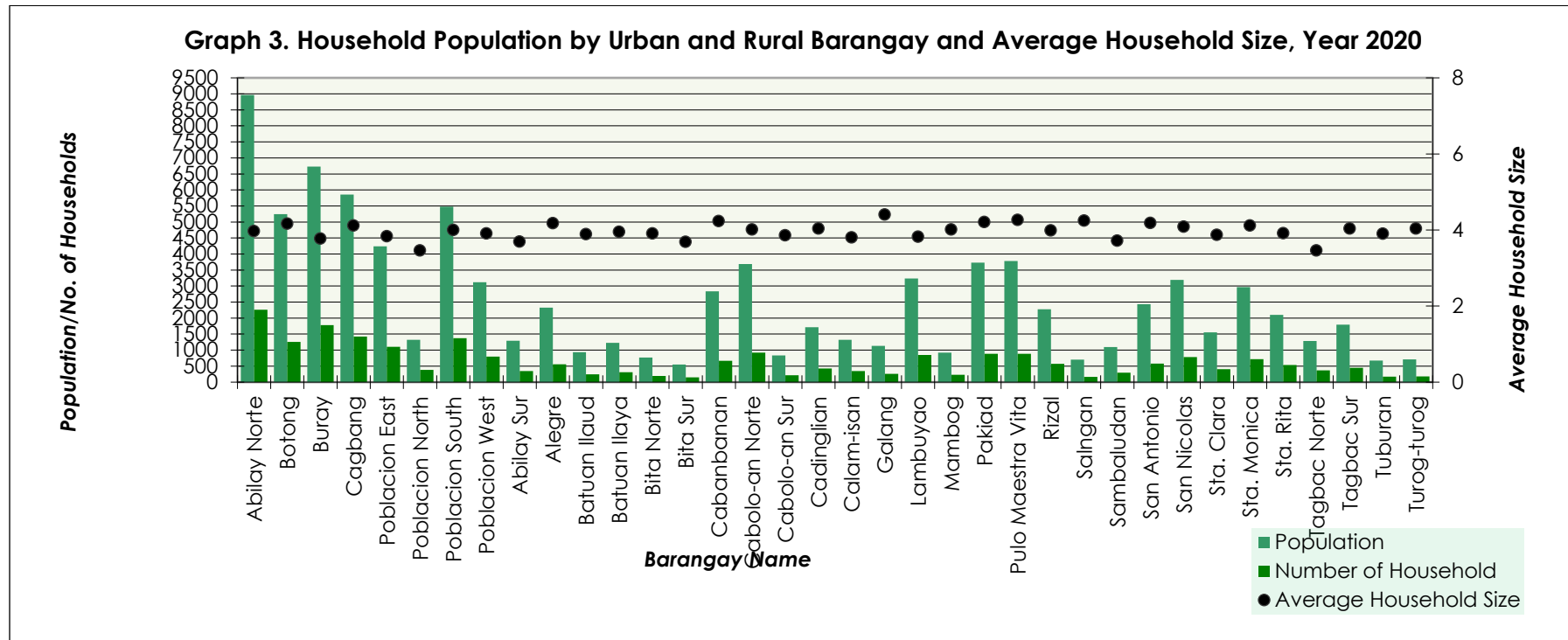

As reflected in **Graph 3**, the top five barangays with the highest population and households are Brgy. Abilay Norte, Brgy. Buray, Brgy. Trapiche, Brgy. Cagbang, and Brgy. Poblacion South. These urban barangays were densely populated due to the presence of several residential subdivisions and the growing economic activities in these areas.



3.1.4 Marital Status by Age Group

According to the 2015 Census of Population reflected in **Table 8**, data shows that for population 10 years old and over 32,082 have single marital status consisting of 17,058 males (53%) and 15,024 females (47%). 32,231 are married consisting of 15,983 males (50%) and 16,248 females (50%), widowed reached 3,756 consisting of 802 males (21%) and

2,954 females (79%), 571 are divorced consisting of 233 males (41%) and 338 females (59%), 4,041 are common-law/live-in consisting of 1,995 males (49%) and 2,046 females (51%), and the remaining 6 have unknown marital status. The Below 20 age group with single marital status has the highest recorded population with 15,866 individuals consisting of 8,232 males and 7,634 females.

3.2 Population Size and Growth Rate

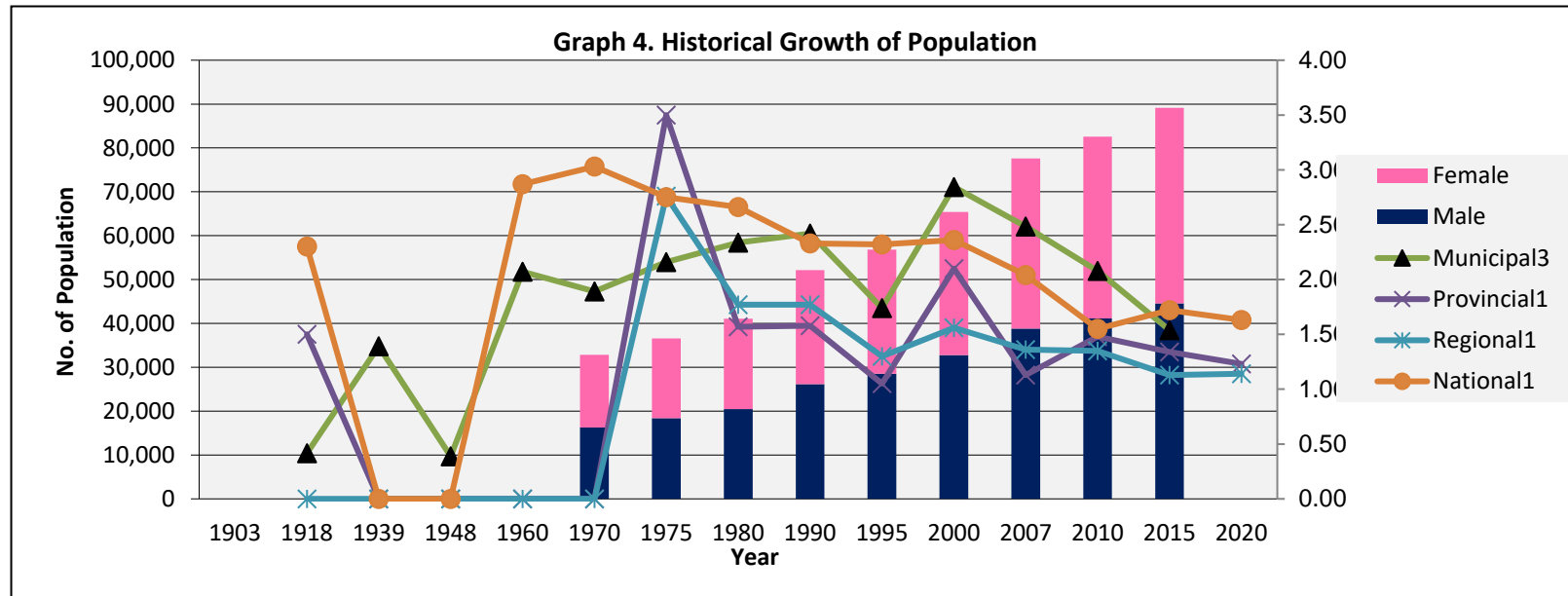
3.2.1. Historical Growth of Population

The population of the Municipality of Oton had been growing fast over the years. From 1970 to 2020, a notable increase in the average annual growth rate can be observed as shown in Table 9 ranging from 0.39% to 2.84%. The highest average annual growth rate occurred in 2000 at 2.84%, which is way higher than the provincial, regional and even national annual growth rate. The lowest annual growth rate was recorded in 1948 at 0.39%. From year 1903, the population of Oton is 14,464 and almost doubled in 1960 at 27,246. From 1970, the recorded population was 32,862 and it reached 98,509 in 2020. It can be observed that there has been a rapid increase in the recorded population based on the previous censuses conducted. The level of growth of the municipality’s population can be attributed to its proximity to the City of Iloilo. The presence of economic activities, development of various residential subdivisions and occurrence of in-migration may have also influenced the increasing trend.

The population annual growth rate indicates how fast a population increases or decreases resulting from the interplay of births, deaths and migration in a given period of time. Graph 4 shows that the average annual growth rate of the municipality is higher than the provincial, regional and national annual growth rate from 2000 to 2020.

3.3 Population Density

3.3.1 Population Density, Gross Population Density, Urban Density and Built-Up Density

According to 2020 Census of Population and Housing as shown in Table 10, Oton has a total population of 98,509. Having an area of 8,644 hectares, the municipality’s gross population density is at 747 persons per hectare. It is also observed that most of the densely populated areas can be found outside the town proper, where most of the residential subdivisions are located. The most densely populated barangays are Brgy. Poblacion East with a population density of 99 persons per hectare, Brgy. Poblacion South with a population density of 96 persons per hectare and Brgy. Poblacion North with a population density of 83 persons per hectare. Barangay Tagbac Sur is the least densely populated barangay with a gross density of 3 persons per hectare.

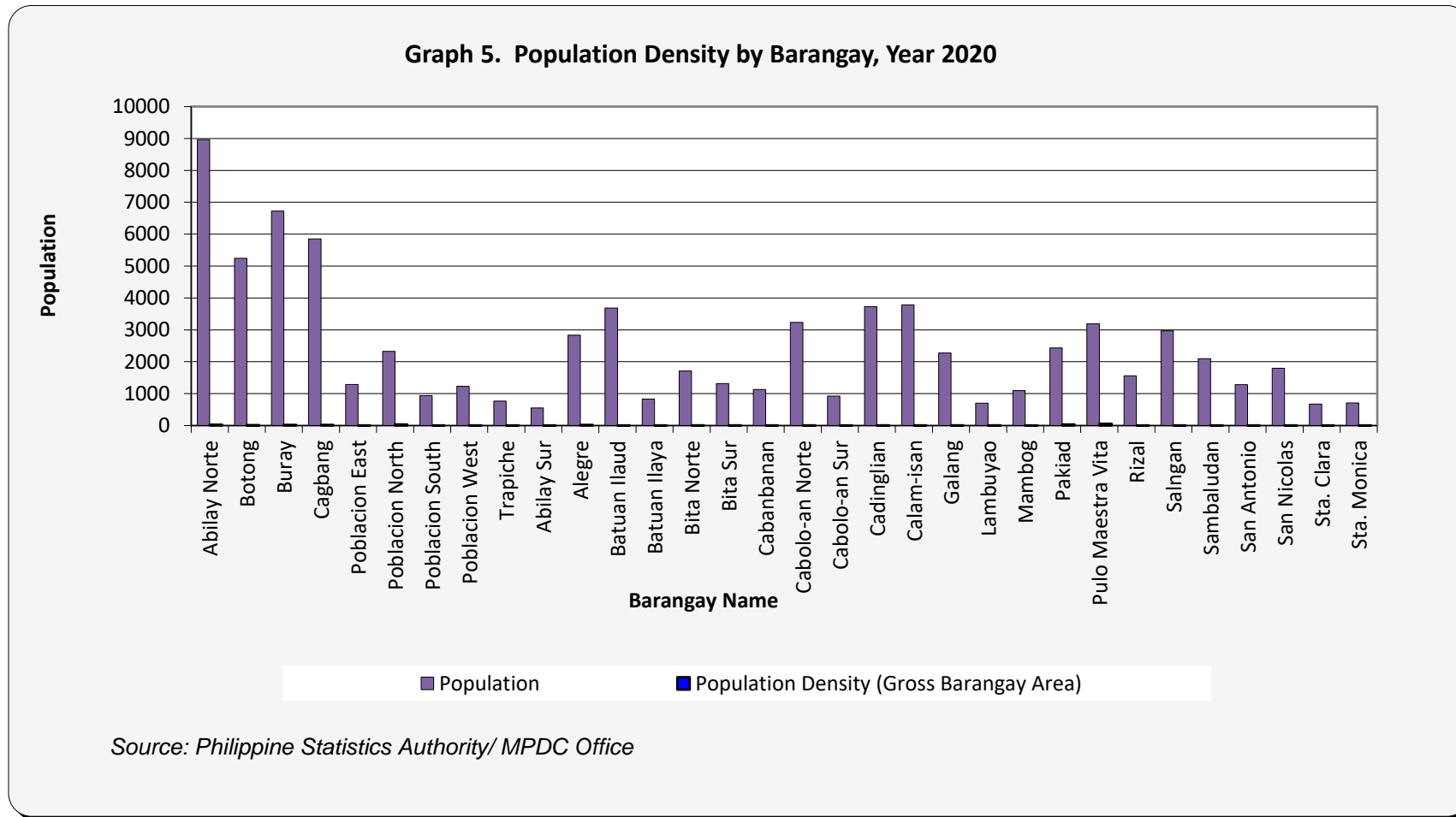
The urban density is pegged at 442 persons per hectare while the rural density is 305 persons per hectare. Based on the data presented in Table 10, it is noticeable that the concentration of population in urban areas is higher than in the rural areas due to the presence of several residential subdivisions and economic activities in the urban barangays. This suggests that development can be directed towards the less dense areas of the municipality to steer up economic activities, taking into consideration the social, economic and environmental potentials and constraints.

Population density refers to the ratio of the total population of an area/ barangay to the total land area. **Graph 5** shows the level of population concentration in different barangays. The differences in densities among barangays maybe attributed to the presence/ absence of facilities, utilities and economic activities.

3.4 Tempo of Urbanization

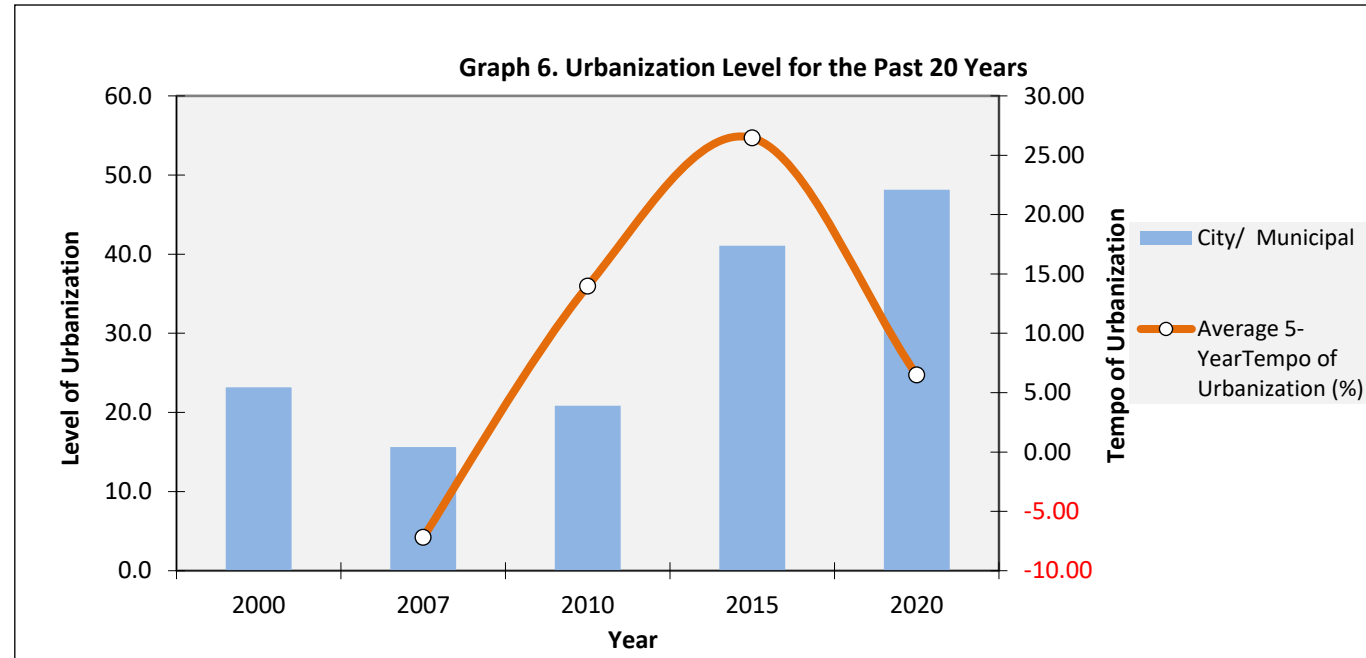
3.4.1 Urbanization Level

In 2020, the level of urbanization or the proportion of the total population living in barangays classified as urban was recorded at 48.2% while in 2015, it was recorded at 41.1%. As shown in Table 11, the urban population has been increasing for the past 20 years while the rural population has been continuously decreasing. In 2020, the total urban population recorded was 47,440, while in 2015, it was recorded at 36,588 which shows an average yearly growth rate of 5.93%. On the other hand, the recorded rural population in 2020 was 51,069 while in 2015, it was recorded at 52,527 which shows an average yearly growth rate of -0.56%. Also observed was an increase in the tempo of urbanization from -7.19% in 2007 to 13.98% in 2010. It continues to increase to 26.46% in 2015 and 6.49% in 2020. This increase may be attributed to the economic activities that is happening in the municipality which resulted in an increase in population. The rapid rate of urbanization may also be attributed to the presence of various residential subdivisions in the municipality which attracts in-migration due to its proximity to the City of Iloilo.

Graph 6 shows that the level of urbanization of the municipality continues to increase for the past 20 years. The notable increase in the urban population only shows the economic development of the municipality that contributes to an increase in population.



3.5 Present Status of Well-Being

3.5.1 Health

3.5.1.1 Health Personnel and Facilities

Presented in **Table 12** are the existing public medical health facilities in the municipality. Currently, there are 11 public health institutions, comprising 1 main health center, 10 BHS dispersed in various barangays, and 1 birthing facility. 27 barangays have no well-structured BHS and only occupy a small space in the barangay multi-purpose halls where they are located. Health personnel take turns rendering duty at the birthing facility, partnered by the midwife assigned to the area where the expectant mother resides. The current human resource for health is composed of the following: doctors (3), nurses (3), midwives (12), dentist (1), and medical technologists (2). During the peak of the CoViD-19 infection, the health center operated 24 hours a day to cater to COVID-related concerns, with two health workers and one ambulance driver on standby. Positive cases are isolated at the Oton Ligtas COVID-19 Center located in Alegre, Oton. It also shows the exposure of medical health facilities to hazards like flooding and storm surge, which vary from low to very high susceptibility.

3.5.1.2 Leading Causes of Morbidity

Based on the data presented in **Table 13**, animal bites topped the list of leading causes of morbidity, followed by COVID-19 and injury (all types). Based on the data presented, animal bite cases in the municipality have been increasing for the past five years. This is due to poor adherence to the anti-rabies ordinance and a continued increase in the dog population. As a result, the majority of cases happen at home. Continued conduct of an information campaign, control of the dog population, and anti-rabies vaccination conducted by the Municipal Agriculture and Cooperatives office.

3.5.1.3 Leading Causes of Mortality

Mortality refers to the number of deaths that have occurred due to a specific illness or condition. Non-communicable diseases have been the most common cause of mortality in the past 5 years. Improvement of programs on lifestyle-related diseases is being done in partnership with the WHO to scale up the delivery of services at the community level.

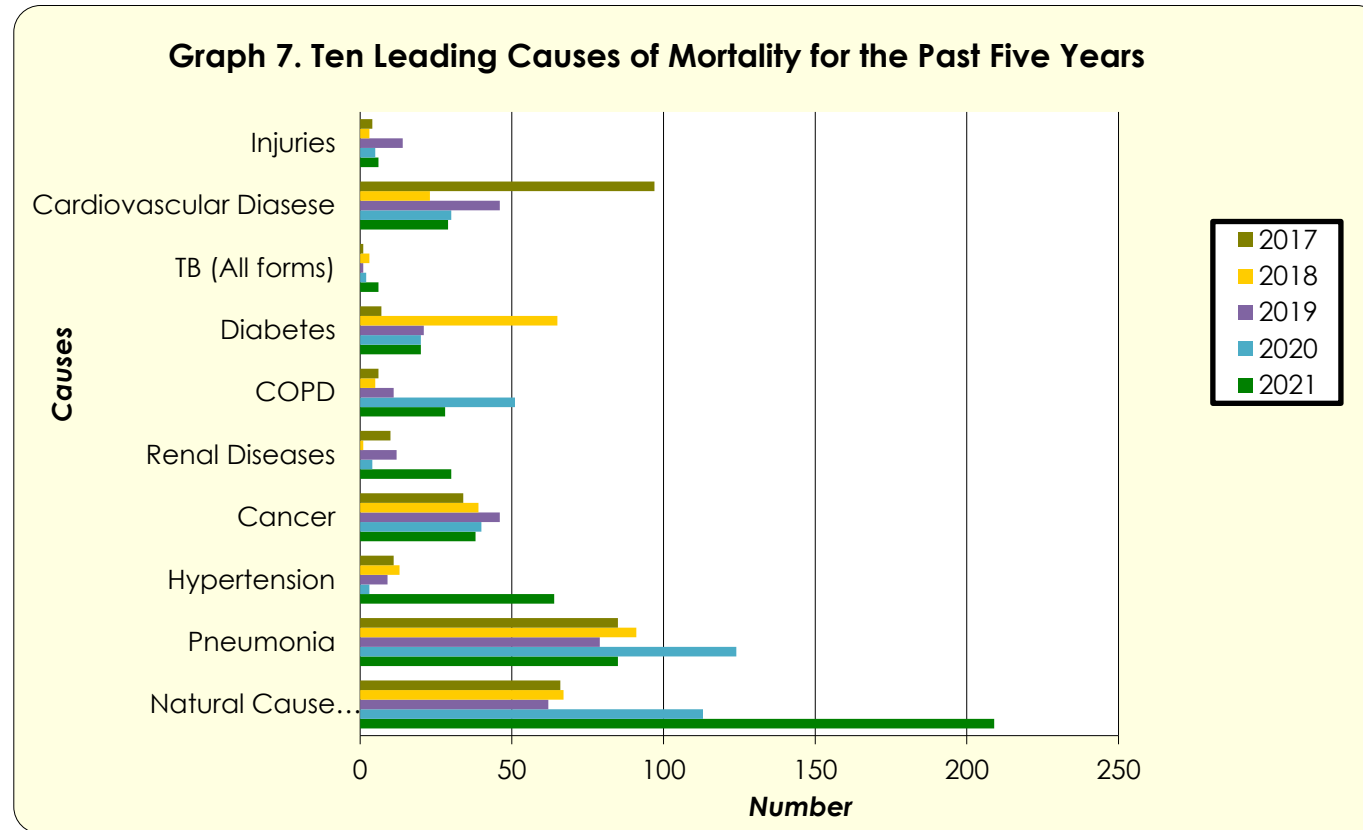
Based on the data presented in **Table 14**, undetermined natural causes of death topped the list of leading causes of mortality with 517 deaths for the past five years. Pneumonia followed with 464 deaths, cardiovascular diseases with 225 deaths, renal diseases with 197 deaths, and diabetes with 133 deaths. Other leading causes of mortality include hypertension, cancer, COPD, all forms of tuberculosis, and injuries.

As shown in **Graph 7**, the undetermined natural cause of death ranked the highest among the leading causes of mortality. Undetermined natural causes of death are deaths that occur as a result of the aging process; thus, this indicates that an aging population dies due to a natural cause.



3.5.1.4 Nutritional Status

Children need the right food at the right time in order to grow and develop their full potential. UNICEF and the World Health Organization (WHO) recommend that infants begin breastfeeding within one hour of birth, be exclusively breastfed for the first six months, and continue breastfeeding until 2 years of age or beyond. Young children should be fed

frequently and in adequate quantities throughout the day, and their meals must be nutrient-dense and comprised of a variety of food groups. Poor diets in early childhood can lead to a deficiency in vitamins and essential nutrients needed by their body, which could weaken their immune system.

The Municipal Health Office of Oton is continuously monitoring the status of malnutrition in children ages 0 to 5 years old. Their weights were classified as wasted, severely wasted, underweight, and severely underweight. The heights were also classified as stunted or severely stunted.

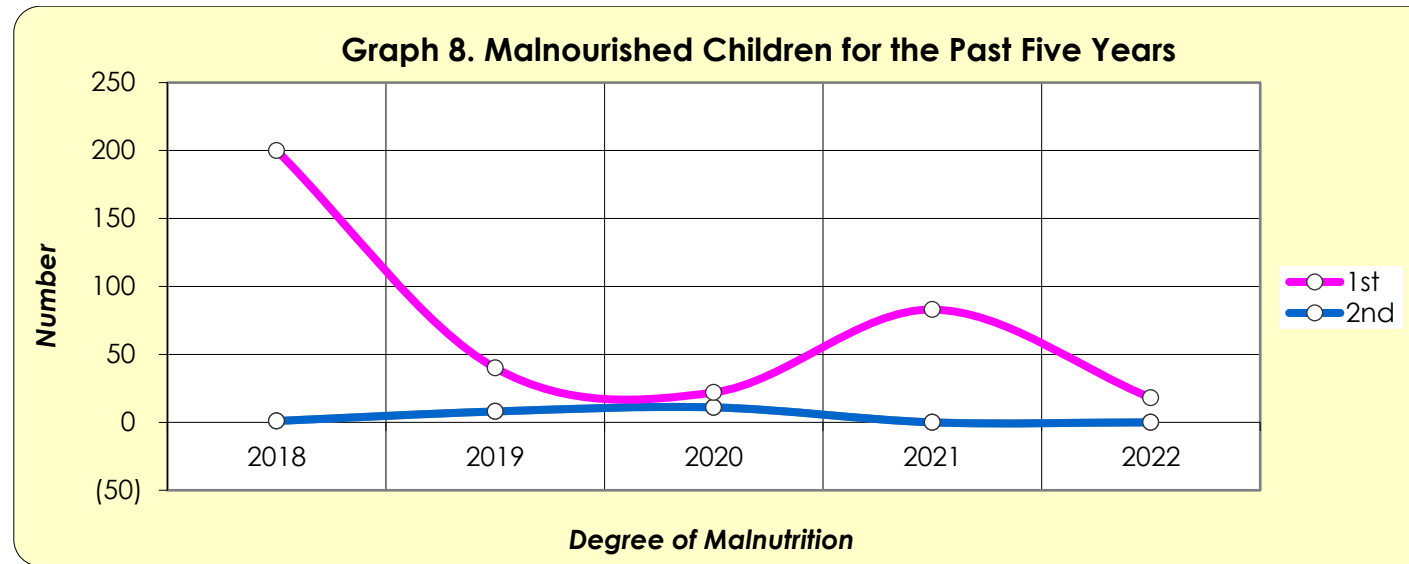
As indicated in the table below, a substantial decline was noticed in the number of children belonging to the wasted, severely wasted, and underweight categories from 2018 to 2022. In 2018, the number of underweight children was recorded at 2.05% and relatively decreased to 0.40% in 2019. However, in 2020, it slightly increased to 0.95% but slightly decreased to 0.22%. In 2022, a slight increase was observed with 0.40% recorded data. No wasted children were recorded for the past five years. In terms of severely wasted children, it was observed that there has been a fluctuating trend for the past five years. Nevertheless, an abrupt shift in figures was recorded as the number of children belonging to wasted, severely wasted, and underweight families noticeably increased in 2020 and 2022. This increase may suggest that there is a deficiency in the implementation of various feeding programs at the same time because of the COVID-19 pandemic and insufficient funding for malnutrition reintegration plans.

Graph 8 shows the relatively decreasing number of malnourished children ages 0 to 5 years old classified into 1st, 2nd, and 3rd degrees. Based on the graph, it can be observed that a fluctuating trend in malnutrition has been seen for the past five years.



3.5.1.5 General Health Situation

Morbidity and mortality describe the frequency and severity of specific illnesses or conditions. Morbidity refers to the state of having a specific illness or condition, while mortality refers to the number of deaths that have occurred due to a specific illness or condition.

The crude birth rate is commonly used as a basic measure of fertility and refers to the number of births per 1,000 divided by the mid-year population of a given area. As presented in **Table 16**, the number of crude births has decreased comparatively, from 1.10% in 2017 to 0.23% in 2021. The decrease in births maybe related to high acceptance of modern Family Planning by couples as a result of different promotional activities starting from pre-marriage counselling up to pre- and post-partum visits as well as on the conduct of USAPAN in every barangay.

The crude death rate refers to the number of deaths occurring within one year relative to the mid-year population expressed per 1,000 people. Data shows an increase in the crude death rate from 3.80% in 2017 to 6.20% in 2021.

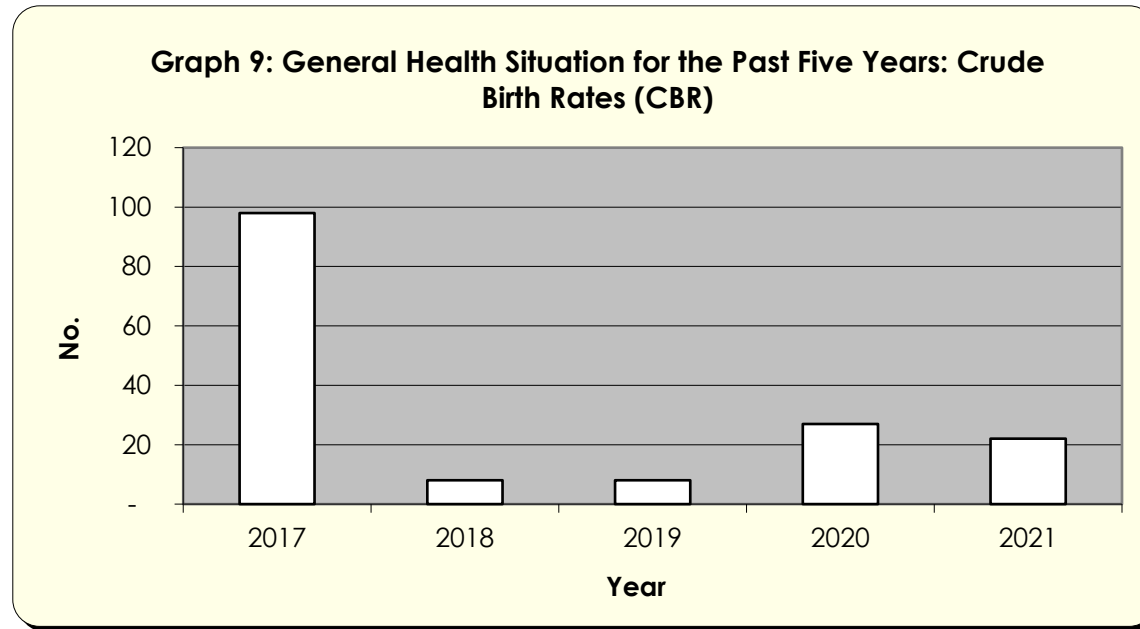

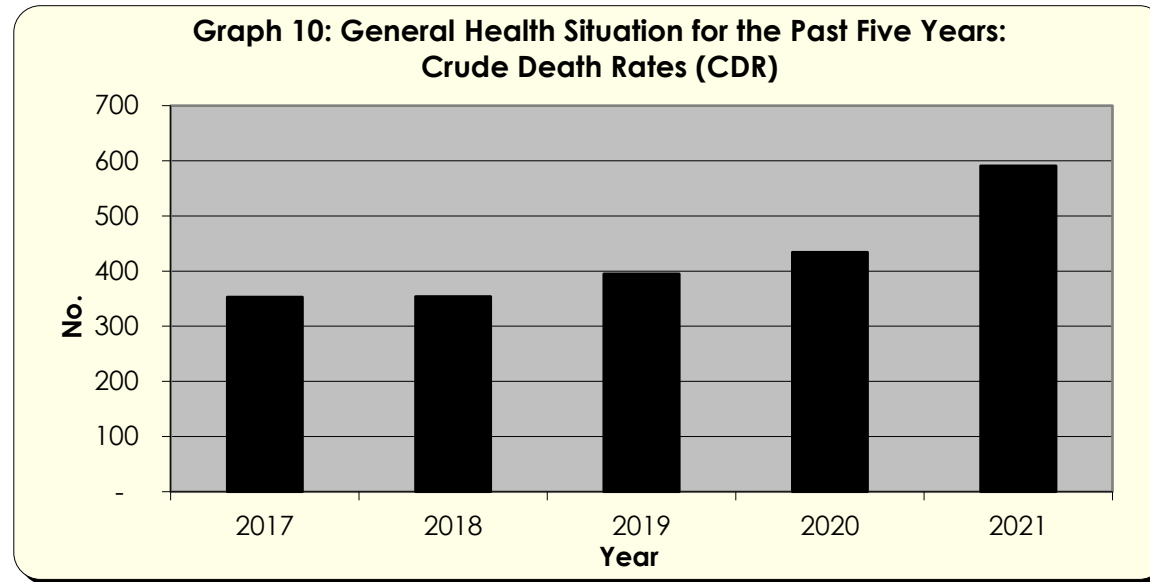

Meanwhile, infant mortality which refers to the number of deaths of under 1 year old per 1,000 live births recorded 2 cases for 2017 and 1 case in 2018. From 2019 to 2021, zero case has been recorded which may be attributed to the sufficient medical care of mothers before giving birth. On the other hand, no cases of young child mortality rate and maternal mortality rate was recorded for the past five years. This may be attributed to the effectivity and efficiency of maternal and child health program of the local government.

Graph 9 reflects that for the past five years, the highest crude birth rate was recorded in 2017 at 1.10%. It also shows that the data decreased in 2018 by 1.02% and was maintained in 2019. However, it increased by 0.20% in 2020 but slightly decreased by 0.05% in 2021.



On the other hand, **Graph 10** presented the crude death rate of the municipality for the past five years. Data shows that there is an increasing trend, especially during the rise of the COVID-19 pandemic in 2020 and 2021. In these two years, a notable increase of 1.63% was recorded in the crude death rate despite the strengthened health programs of the municipality amidst COVID-19.



3.5.1.6 Family Planning Services

The Local Government Unit gave importance to family planning by offering the various services, especially to the poor and marginalized sector. These family planning services which may be availed at the Rural health Unit include the following:

- A. Oral Contraceptives
- B. Condom
- C. Injectable
- D. Implant
- E. Intra-Uterine Device (IUD) Postpartum and Interval
- F. Standard Days Method (SDM)
- G. Lactation Amenorrhea Method (LAM)

3.5.2 Social welfare

3.5.2.1 Social Welfare Programs and Services

Table 17 shows the programs and services offered and implemented by the Municipal Social Welfare and Development Office for the year 2022. These programs and services are designed for the enhancement, protection and empowerment of the Senior Citizens, Children, PWD, Women, PYAP, Youth, ERPAT, Disadvantage Families, Solo Parents, PWUD’s, Children in Conflict with the Law and Abused Women and Children. The highest number of clientele served were the senior citizens, followed by disadvantaged families and day care children. The least number of clientele served were the children in conflict with the Law with 10 recorded cases.

3.5.2.2 Social Welfare Facilities, Services and Clientele

Table 18 shows the social welfare facilities, services, and clientele served for the year 2022. All of these social welfare facilities are government-owned and are either managed by the barangay or municipal government. As presented in the table below, the Senior Citizen Center needs rehabilitation of its ceiling. The other three municipal facilities, such as the CICL Center and the Crisis Center for Women and Children, also need improvement or renovation. In addition, the majority of the daycare centers in barangays also need

to be improved in order to provide a convenient and safe place for daycare children. In addition, the MSWDO was transferred to a temporary office due to the ongoing construction of the new municipal hall.

3.5.3.1 Literacy Rate

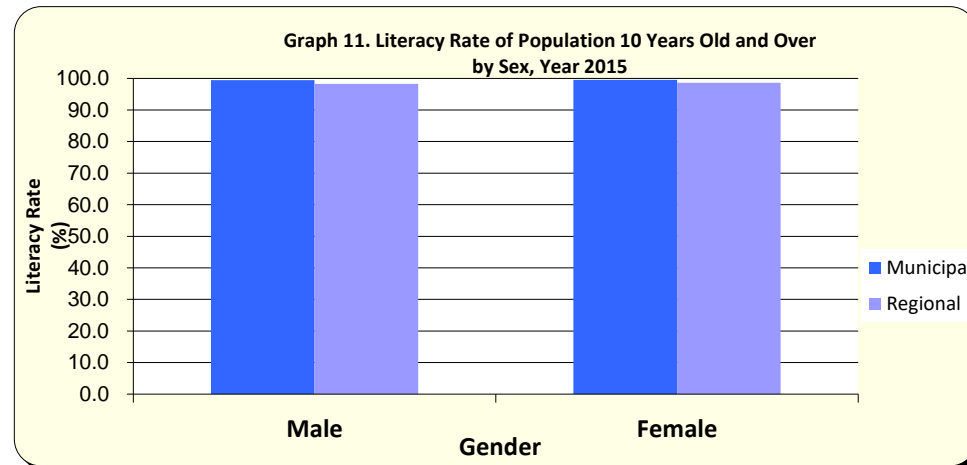
The 2015 Census Report reflected in Table 20 shows that 72,214 or 99.5% of the population 10 years and older, comprising of 35,802 males and 36,412 females, are literate or able to read and write. The illiterate in the municipality were recorded at 346 or 0.5% comprising of 192 males and 154 females. Data also shows that the female literacy rate which is 99.6% is higher than the male literacy rate at 99.5%. Moreover, it also shows that the municipal literacy rate is higher than the regional data which is 98.4%.

Graph 11 shows that the literacy rate of male and female population 10 years and older is almost equal. It also shows that the municipal rate is higher compared to the regional level.

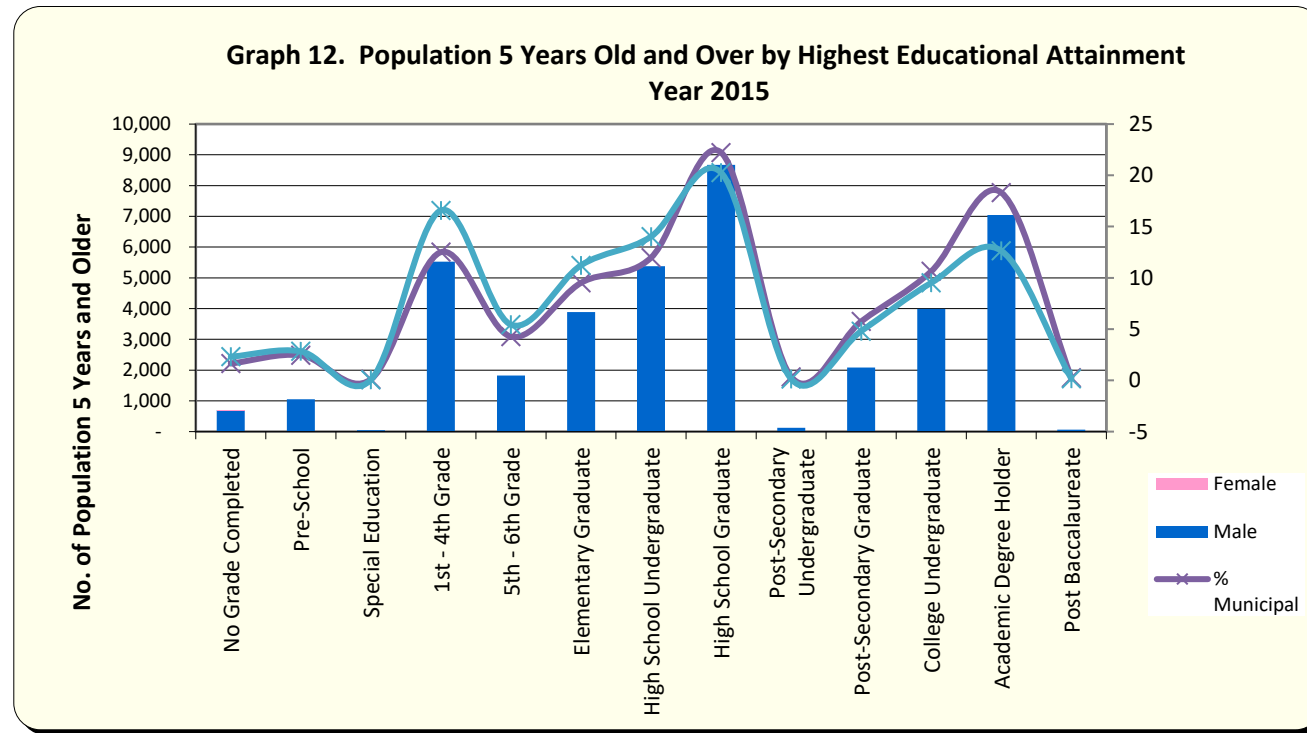


3.5.3.2 Highest Educational Attainment

The 2015 Census Report of the Philippine Statistics Authority as reflected in Table 21 shows that 21,307 or 26% of the population were able to reach elementary but only 7,711 or 10% were able to graduate. On the other hand, 27,714 or 34% were able to attend high school but only 18,012 or 22% graduated from high school. Meanwhile, 14,842 or 18% of the population were academic degree holder.

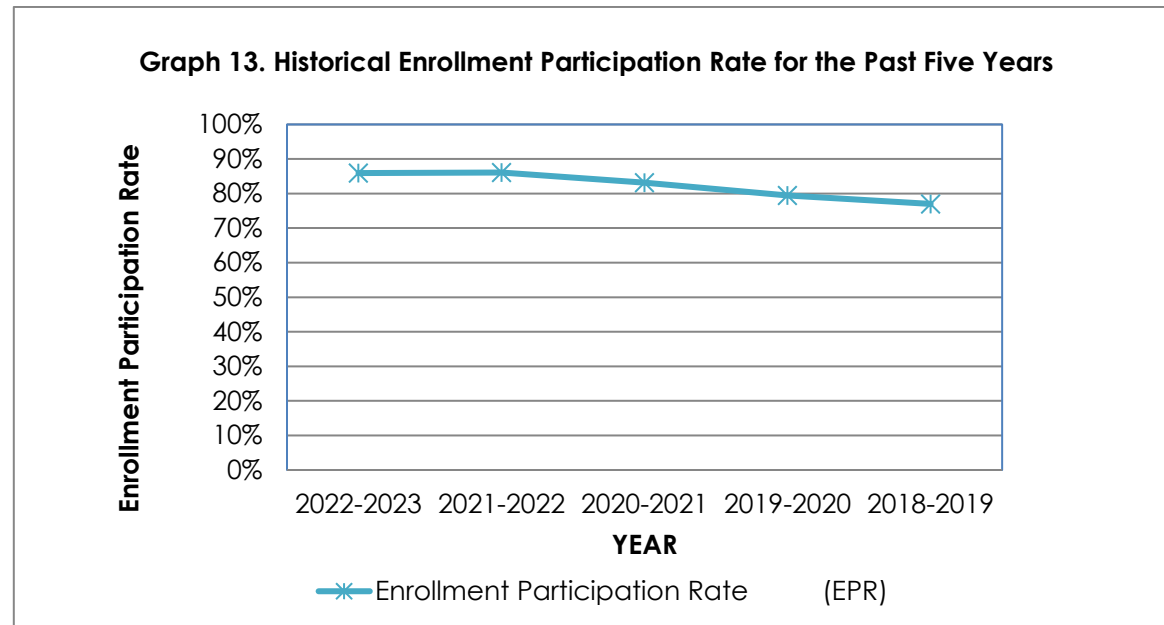
3.5.3.3 Enrollment Participation Rate

3.5.3.4 Enrolment by Level

Table 23 shows the historical enrollment data of both private and public schools in the Schools District of Oton. In school years 2018-2019 and 2019-2020, preparatory or kindergarten showed a difference of -13.48% or a decrease in the enrollment rate from 1,031 to 892. In school year 2020-2021, there was an increase of 26.9 %. In school year 2021-2022, there was a dramatic decrease of -5.2% and -4.4% in school year 2022-2023 due to pandemic. For the elementary or Grades 1-6, school year 2018-2019 and 2019-2020 had an ample increase of 0.4%. School year 2020-2021, showed a -3.5% decrease in enrollment. Luckily in school year 2021-2022, there was an increase of 0.6 % but for school year 2022-2023, a decrease of 245 or -3.1% in the enrollment caused by the pandemic. For secondary schools, junior high school for school years 2018-2019 and 2019-2020 had an increase of

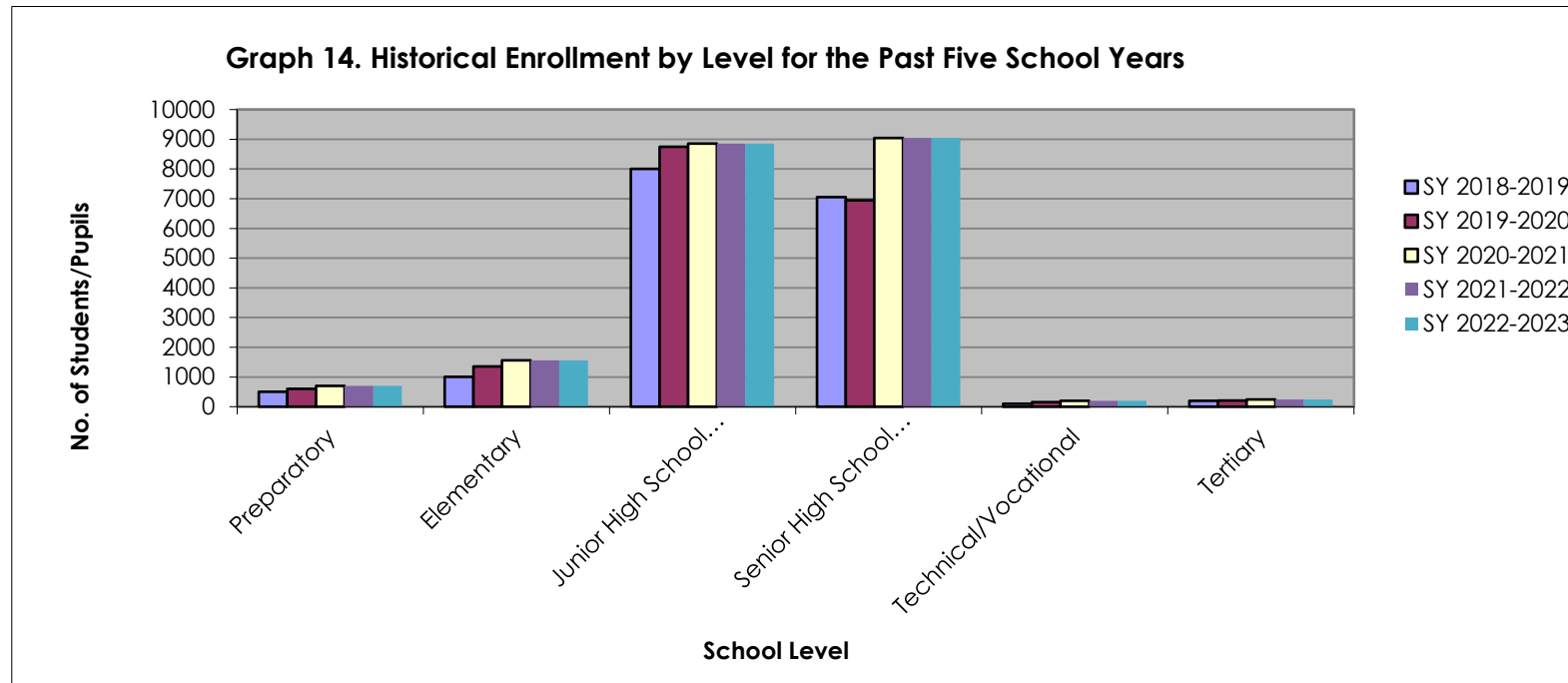
4.7% and 3.4% for school year 2020-2021, but it was taken back by the pandemic with -3.3%. Senior high school enrollment for school years 2018-2019 and 2019-2020 showed an increase of 19.1% and an overwhelming increase of 30.7% for school year 2020-2021. In school year 2021-2022, almost half of the percentage in the previous year was the only increase of 18.3%. Luckily, the pandemic did not give any negative effect in the enrollment for school year 2022-2023 with the increase of 17.7%.

Overall, the enrollment for school years 1, 2, 3, and 4 consecutively increased and a little downslope of 7 learners in year 5.

3.5.3.5 Student-Teacher and Classroom Ratio

The table below shows the learner-teacher and learner-classroom ratio in both private and public schools from kindergarten to senior high school.

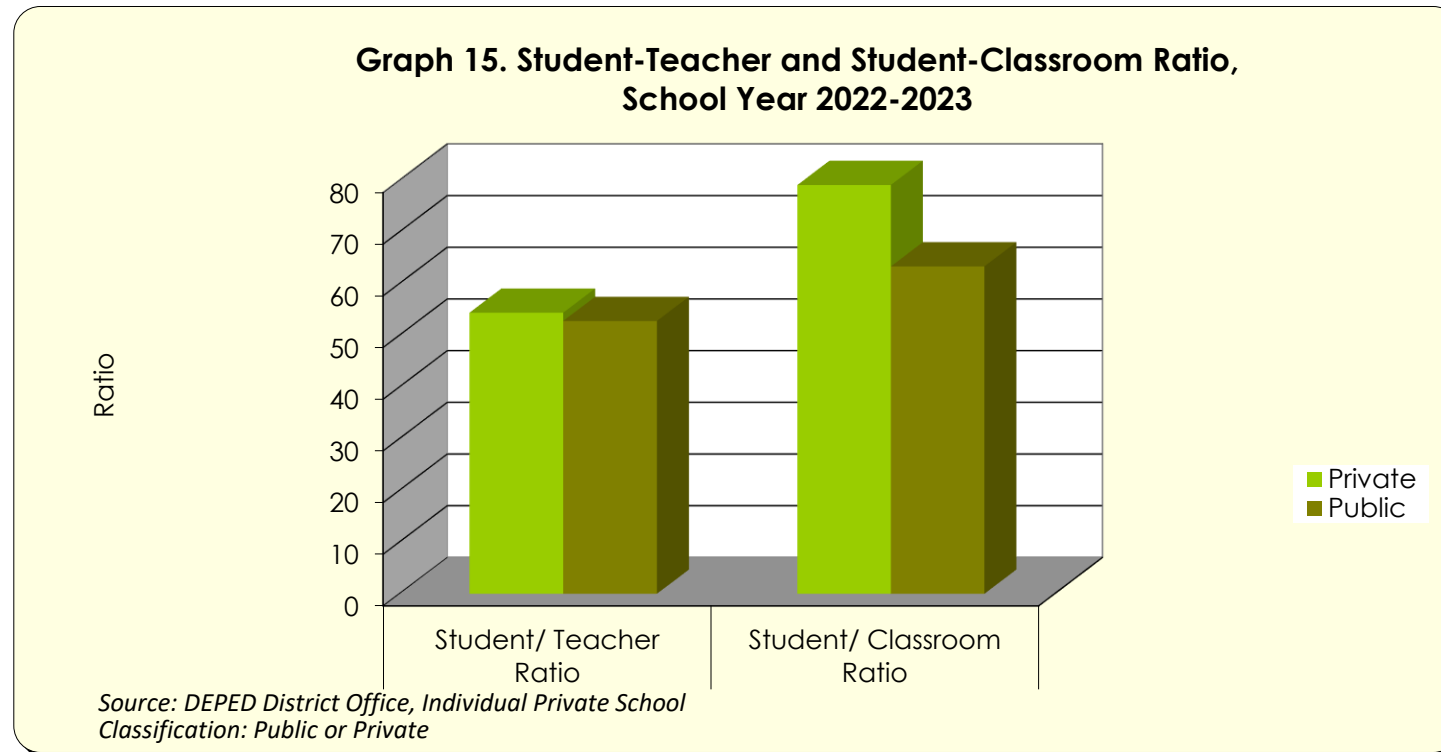
In private schools, the learners-teacher and learners-classroom ratio in preparatory or kindergarten is 12:1. In Grades 1-6, the learners-teacher ratio is 18:1 and 16:1 for learners-classroom ratio. In Junior HS, the total enrollment is 68 while there are 8 teachers, wherein the ratio is 9:1 and for learner-classroom ratio, it is 14:1. Lastly, the SHS ratio is 13:1 for learners-teachers and there is no data for the learners- classroom ratio. In general, the learners-teacher ratio is 14:1 and for learners-classroom ratio, it is 54:1.

In public schools, the enrollment is 1019 while there are 24 teachers for preparatory or Kindergarten which means the ratio is 42:1 and for learners-classroom ratio, it is 39:1. In Grades 1- 6 or elementary as indicated in the table, the learners-teacher ratio is 25:1 and for learners-classroom ratio, it is 28:1. In JHS, there are 6,058 total enrollments with 233 teachers; the ratio is 26:1 and 56:1 for learners-classroom ratio. and for SHS, the ratio for learners-teacher is 43:1 since the 3,004 total enrollment with only 70 teachers and the ratio for learners-classroom is 429:1. For the summary, the learners-teacher ratio is 28:1 and for learners-classroom ratio, it is 1,173:1.

3.5.4 Housing

3.5.4.1 Number of Housing Units, by Type of Building and Construction Materials

Based on 2015 Census of Population Oton reached a total of 20,203 occupied housing units, 20,460 households, 88,988 household population with average household size of 4.35, and the ratio of households to occupied housing units is 1.01 while the ratio of household population to occupied housing units is 4.40. Out of the 20,203 occupied housing

units 19,601 are single house, 407 are duplex, 169 are multi-unit residential, 16 commercial/industrial/agricultural and for the remaining 10 occupied housing units the type of building is not reported. Majority of the occupied housing units are single house which is 97% of the total occupied housing units.

Based on 2015 Census of Population out of the 20,203 total occupied housing units, 15,402 have roof made of galvanized iron/aluminum, 1,483 have roof made of tile/concrete/clay tile, 1,050 have roof made of half galvanized iron and half concrete, 2,187 have roof made of bamboo/cogon/nipa/anahaw, 29 have roof made of asbestos, 45 have roof made of makeshift/salvaged/improvised materials, and 7 are made of trapal. For the material for outer walls 8,402 occupied housing units are made of

concrete/brick/stone, 2,033 have outer walls made of wood, 3,006 have outer walls made of half concrete/brick/stone and half wood, 105 have outer walls made of galvanized iron/aluminum, 6,458 have outer walls made of bamboo/sawali/cogon/nipa, 6 have outer walls made of asbestos, 1 has outer walls made of glass, 74 have outer walls made of makeshift/salvaged/improvised materials, 10 have outer walls made of trapal, and the remaining 108 are made of other materials or not reported. Housing units with roof made of galvanized iron/aluminum and outer walls made of concrete/brick/stone have the highest number of occupied housing units for 2015.

3.5.4.2 Tenure Status of Occupied Housing Units and Lots

The tenure status of households in occupied housing units or lots can be categorized by the percentage of owner households, renting households, and those occupying houses or lots with or without consent of the owner. Based on 2007 PSA Census of Population as reflected in Table 27, there are 16,120 households with 10,139 lots (63%) owned or being amortized, 945 lots (6%) rented, 4,467 lots (28%) occupied for free with consent of the owner, and 486 lot (3%) occupied for free without consent of the owner.

Meanwhile based on 2010 PSA CPH, there are 17,948 households with 11,567 lots (64%) owned or being amortized, 997 lots (6%) rented, 4,964 lots (28%) occupied for free with consent of the owner, and 355 lot (2%) occupied for free without consent of the owner. Compared to 2007 tenure status of lots, for the lots owned or being amortized, the number of lots increased by 1,428. In terms of the rented lots, the number of lots increased by 52. In terms of the lots occupied for free with consent of the owner, the number of lots increased by 497. Lastly, for the number of lots occupied for free without consent of the owner, the number of lots decreased by 131.

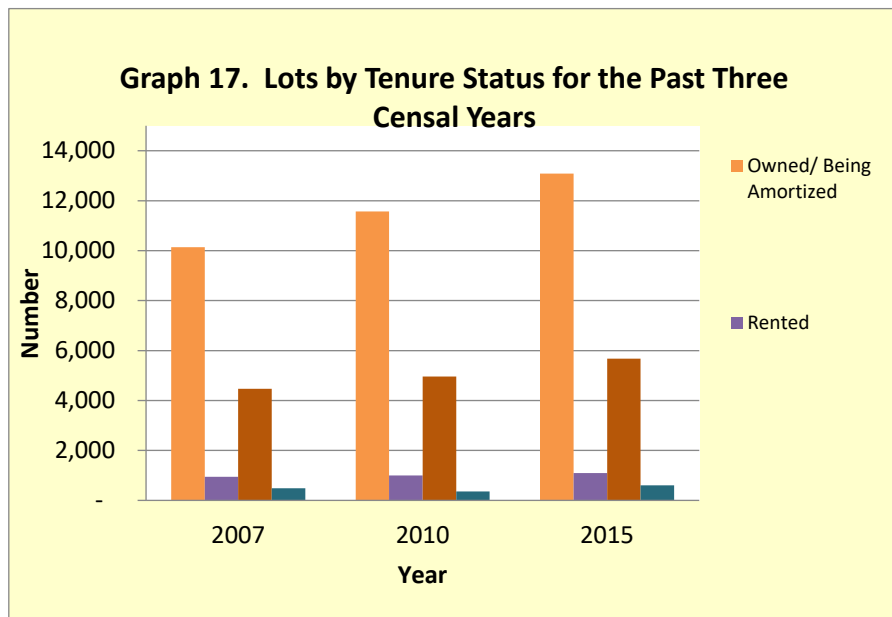
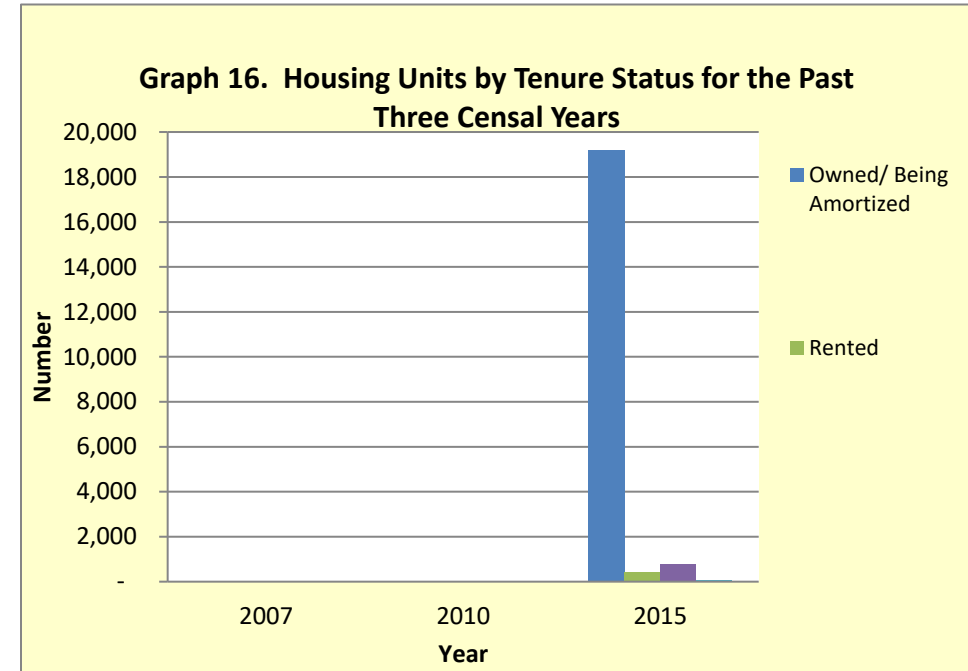
Moreover, the result of 2015 PSA Census of Population shows that there are 20,460 households with 13,081 households (64%) own the house and lot, 426 households (2%) rent the house or room including the lot , 672 households (4%) owns the house while renting the lot, 4,886 households (24%) own the house while renting the lot for free with consent of the owner, 550 households (3%) own the house while renting the lot for free without consent of the owner, 788 households (4%) occupy the house and lot for free with consent of the owner, and 57 households occupy the house and lot for free without consent of the owner.

As reflected in Graph 16, there are 19,189 housing units owned or being amortized, 426 housing units that are rented, 788 housing units occupied for free with consent of owner, and 57 housing units occupied for free without consent of owner.



As reflected in Graph 17, the number of lots owned or amortized, lots rented, lots occupied for free with consent of the owner increase over time where the highest occurred in 2015 with 13,081 lots owned or amortized, 1,098 lots rented, and 5,647 lots occupied for free with consent of the owner. The number of lots occupied for free without consent of the owner decrease at 2010 then increase in 2015.

3.5.4.3 Housing Facilities and Utilities Situation

Services and utilities such as water, power, garbage disposal, sanitation and roads are considered basic services and facilities essential for households. As shown in Table 26 based on 2000 PSA Census of Population and Housing (CPH), out of 12,907 total housing units, 1,972 or 15% have access to water supply, 10,455 or 81% are energized, 11,011 or 85% have water-sealed toilets, and 1,389 or 11% have access to garbage collection system.

Based on 2010 PSA CPH, the total housing units reached to 17,948. Out of the total housing units 1,458 or 8% of total housing units have access to water supply, 16,847 or 94% are energized, 16,213 or 90% have water-sealed toilets, and 5,319 or 30% have access to garbage collection system. Compared to the percentage of housing units served with services and utilities in 2000, there is a 7% decrease in the percentage of households served with water supply, on the other hand other services and utilities increased by 13%, 5%, and 19% for electricity, water-sealed toilets, and garbage collection system respectively.

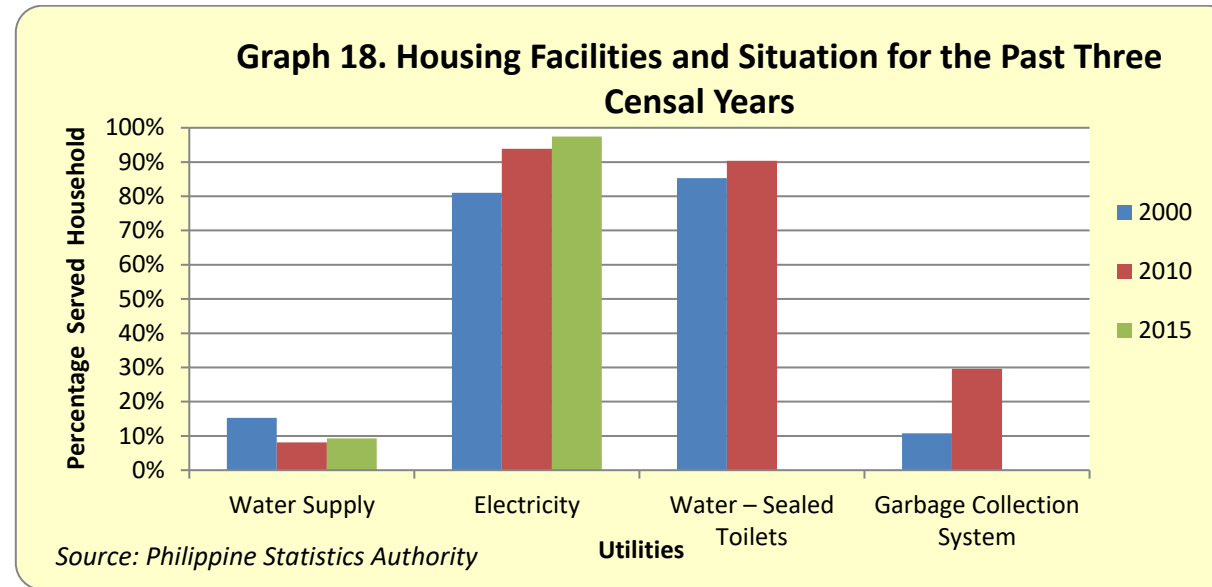
Meanwhile based on 2015 PSA CPH, there are 20,460 total housing units, 1,896 or 9% have access to water supply, and 19,945 or 97% of total housing units are energized. Compared to the percentage of housing units served with services and utilities in 2010, there is a 1% decrease in the percentage of households served with water supply, on the other hand the percentage of housing units served with electricity increased by 3%.

As shown in Graph 18, the highest percentage of housing units served with water supply was in 2000 with 15% of the total housing units, for the electricity, the highest percentage of housing units served was in 2015 with 97% of the total housing units, for the water-sealed toilets, the highest percentage of housing units served was in 2010 with 90% of the total housing units, and for the garbage collection system, the highest percentage of housing units served was in 2010 with 30% of the total housing units.



3.5.4.4 Informal Settlement Areas

The municipality is facing problems in the housing sub-sector due to the large number of informal settlers. As reflected in Table 29, data shows the informal settlers in 2022 reached to 8,147 households consists of displaced households affected by flood, storm surge, infrastructure projects, threat of eviction, and with eviction order.

Out of the total informal settlers, 4,127 households (51%) are located in hazard areas, 6 households or are affected by infrastructure projects, 53 households have court order for demolition or eviction, and 3,961 households (49%) have pending threats of demolition or eviction. 31 barangays (84%) of the 37 total barangays have recorded existence of informal settlers. The barangay with highest number of informal settlers is Abilay Norte with 1,675 informal settler families followed by Poblacion West, San Antonio, Lambuyao, and Buray.

3.5.4.5 Resettlement Area

As reflected in Table 30 data show the resettlement area in the municipality. Otonville subdivision is the resettlement site managed by the municipality under the municipal social welfare office with 130 housing units fully occupied by 130 households and with services and facilities namely; water, electricity and communication. In terms of hazard susceptibility for flooding, landslide, tsunami, and storm surge, Otonville has low risks to the abovementioned hazards which is ideal for a resettlement area.

The resettlement area was implemented through the partnership of Local Government Unit of Oton, National Housing Authority, and Gawad Kalinga Community Development Foundation. Additional resettlement site in the municipality is a key to decrease the backlog and concerns with informal settlers.

3.5.4.6 Conditions of Occupied Housing Units

The housing units’ condition or the state of repair of the housing unit is one of the issues faced by housing sub-sector. Based on 2010 PSA CPH as reflected in Table 31, it shows that the total occupied housing units built from 1970-2010 is 17,774, out of the total occupied housing units 13,605 (77%) needs no repair or minor repair, 2,562 (14%) needs major repair, 75 (0.43%) are dilapidated/condemned, 316 (1.78%) are under renovation/being repaired, 694 (3.90%) are unfinished construction and 319 (1.79%) are housing units are under construction.

Housing units naturally degrade over time due to various factors in the environment. Housing units that are made of light materials easily degrades compared to housing units made of concrete, housing units made of light materials also are vulnerable to hazards like typhoon, tsunami, storm surge which also affects the lives and the livelihood of the residents.

3.5.5 Employment Rate

3.5.5.1 Labor Force Employment Status

Labor force or the economically active population refers to population 15 years old and above who are either employed or unemployed. As reflected in Table 33, the 2015 Census Report shows that Oton has a total labor force of 64,561. About 36,472 or 56.5% of the labor force are employed while 28,089 or 43.5% are unemployed. 74% or 23,591 of

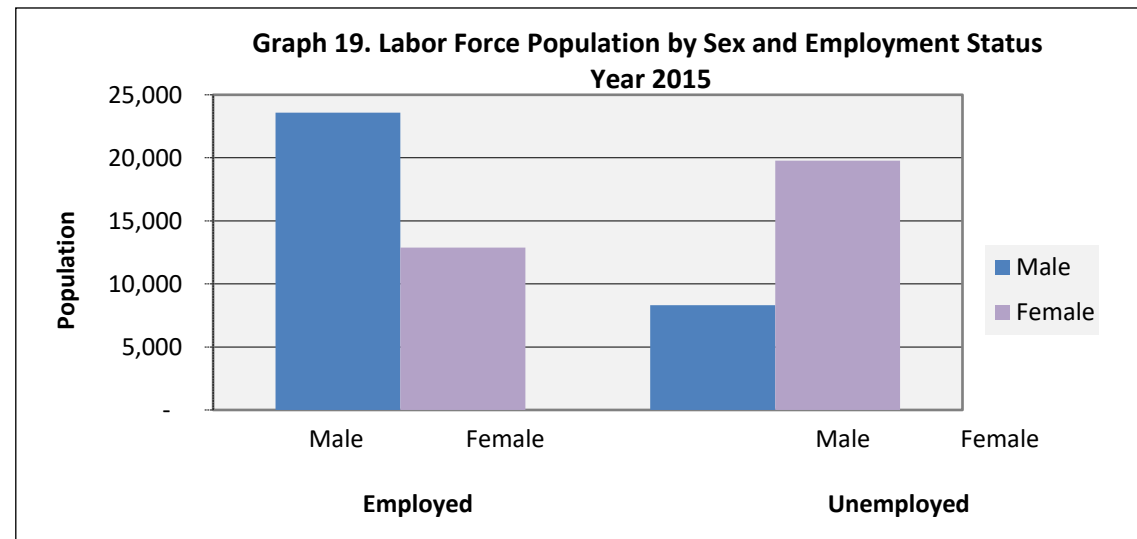

Graph 19 shows that majority of the male labor force population which comprises 74% are employed while the remaining 26% are unemployed. It also reflects that 39.4% of the female labor force population were employed while 60.6% remains unemployed.



As shown in Table 34, the gainful workers of the municipality for 2015 were segregated by sex, occupation and age group. The dominant occupation group is the elementary occupations with 8,461 workers comprising of 5,372 males and 3,089 females. In addition, the armed forces are the lowest occupation group with 49 individuals consisting of 48 males and 1 female.

3.5.5.2 Overseas Workers

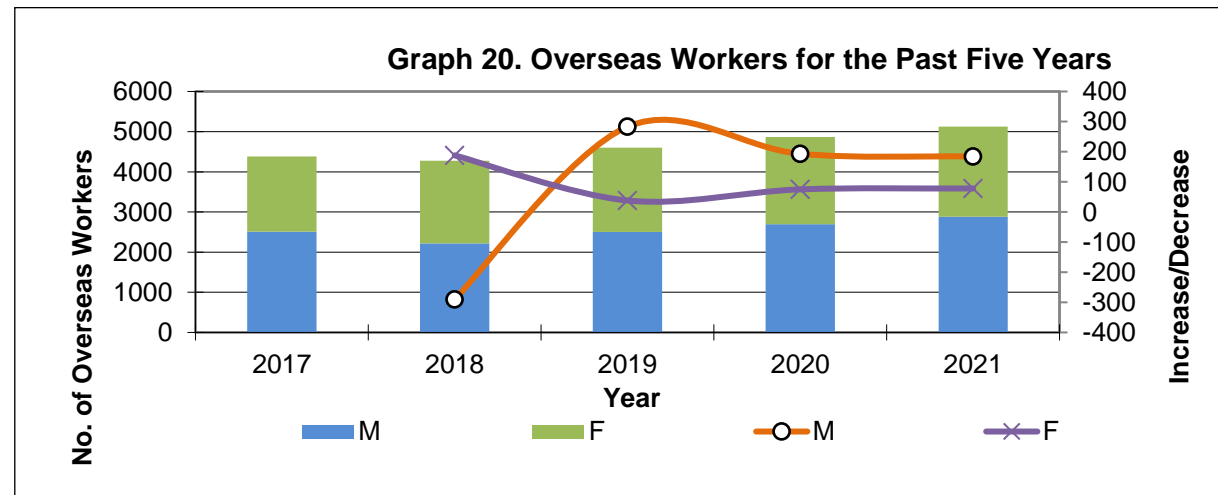
As per municipal data presented in Table 35, the number of overseas workers from 2017 to 2021 has been increasing to as high as 8%. Despite of the imposition of COVID-19 restrictions by the different countries, a notable increase of 6% in the number of OFWs was recorded in 2020 and 5% increase in 2021. This only shows that the COVID-19 pandemic does not hinder the deployment of overseas workers.

3.5.6 Recreation and Sports Facilities

3.5.6.1 Recreational Facilities

Sports and recreation, as one of the basic needs of people which is very vital to the total development of the citizenry. As provided in the Local Government Code of 1991, sports and recreation shall be promoted to provide leisure and wholesome activities to its people. The Department of Education (DepEd) takes charge of the development and evaluation of progress of organized sports and physical fitness for the improvement of all the members of the community.

The Municipality of Oton could only provide its citizens minimum sports and recreational facilities. It is concentrated in the Public Plaza, Parks and Multi-Purpose Gym. Some barangays with multi-purpose pavements utilize these for basketball and volleyball courts. The same is true with the public schools’ grounds, but are available only during school days for learners’ use only. For those barangays who cannot avail with good and well-planned sports facilities, the residents content themselves with makeshift basketball courts. Other barangay residents during the summer season make use of vacant rice fields as diamonds for softball and basketball competition. It has been a practice among the barangay folks to hold sports competition during dry or summer season and during the barangay fiesta.

The presence of various sports and recreational facilities manifest the inclination of the Ogtonganons in sports activities, wherein, they can enjoy, learn and have fun at the same time. **Table SR-1** shows the existing sports and recreational facilities in different barangays. Also shown below are the area, the ownership of these facilities, its physical condition, and if used as evacuation center.

3.5.7 Protective Services

3.5.7.1 Police Personnel

Table 37 shows the protective services facilities and equipment. At present, there are 45 police personnel assigned to the municipal police station, public market, and other conspicuous and populated places, serving a total population of 98,509 (PSA, 2020 CPH). Some are on patrol during follow-up, raid, surveillance, and other police operations. The policeman-to-population ratio is 1:2,189, which is below the standard requirement of one (1) policeman for every one thousand (1,000) people. This simply signifies that the municipality will need additional policemen in the coming years.

The police station is located at Sitio Manue, Barangay Tagbac Sur, with an area of 1,000 square meters, which is below the standard lot requirement for a type A municipal station that caters to more than 75,000 population. At present, the police station has two 692 patrol cars used for police operations. It also has 1 landline, 2 smart phones, 1 base radio, and 5 functional handheld radios that serve as primary telecommunication mediums. On the other hand, the 37 barangays have a handheld radio used during emergencies and other important activities, with a base stationed in the municipal hall and monitored by a radio operator. Currently, the Oton Municipal Police Station has 2 lock-up cells, 1 for males and 1 for females, with a 1:5 female ratio and a 1:8 male per cell ratio.

3.5.7.2 Crime Incidence

Index crimes are those that are serious in nature and that occur with sufficient frequency and regularity such that they can serve as an index to the crime situation. These include the crimes of murder, homicide, physical injury (serious and less serious), robbery, theft, and rape. Index crimes are classified into two categories: crimes against persons and crimes against property. On the other hand, non-index crimes are violations of special laws such as illegal drugs, VAWC, child abuse, traffic code, illegal position of firearms, illegal logging, illegal gambling, juvenile act, etc

Table 38 shows the historical crime incidence by barangay for adults from 2017 to 2021. It reveals that Barangay Poblacion South had the highest number of recorded crimes, which totaled 144, or 14.13% of the total crimes committed. It was followed by Barangay Poblacion East with 96 crimes committed, or 9.42% of the total crimes committed, and Barangay Abilay Norte with 80 recorded crimes, or 7.9% of the total crimes committed. Barangay Batuan Ilaud has the least number of recorded crimes, which totaled two (2) crimes for the past five years.

Based on the table below, it can also be observed that the highest number of crimes recorded was in 2017, which reached 257 cases. Meanwhile, in 2018, there were a total of 208 crimes committed, which increased to 227 in 2019. However, in 2020, the total number of crimes committed decreased to 186 and eventually decreased to 159 in 2021. Data also shows that there has been a decreasing trend in crime incidence for the past five years.

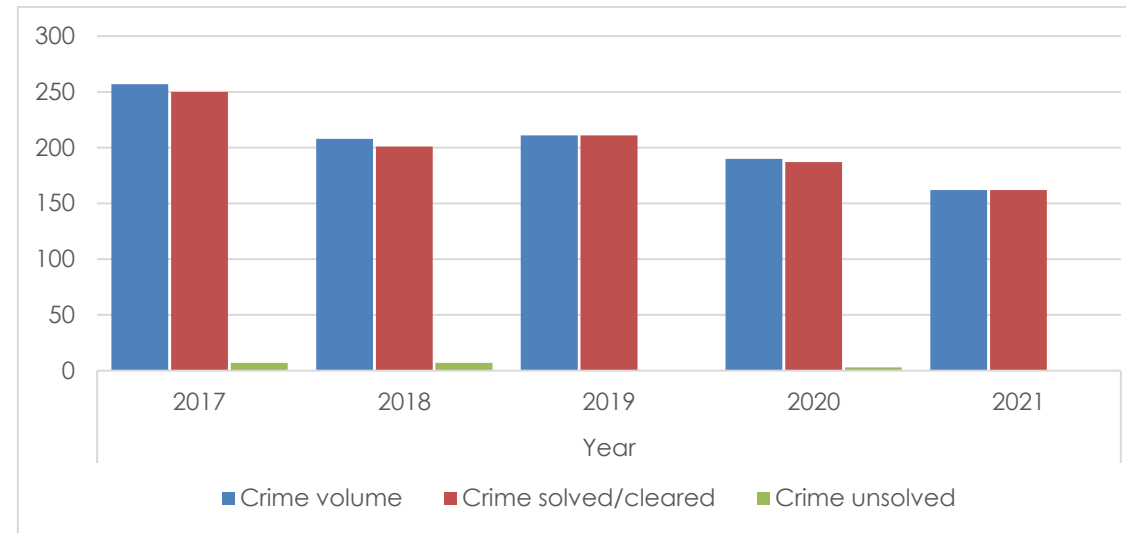
Table 39 shows the crime solution efficiency for adults from 2017 to 2021. In 2017, the percentage of crimes solved was 97.28%. It has slightly decreased to 96.63% in 2018 and has reached 100% crime solution efficiency in 2019. However, in 2021, it decreased to 98.42% but eventually reached 100% in 2021. 3.5.7.3 Children in Conflict with the Law (CICL)

Children in Conflict with the Law (CICL) refers to children ages 18 and below, alleged as, accused of, or adjudged as having committed an offense under Philippine Laws as defined under Republic Act No. 9344 or the Juvenile Justice and Welfare Act. Children in this age group need special protection and assistance to become better person.

Based on the data reflected in **Table 40**, a total of 41 cases have been recorded municipal-wide for the period 2017–2021. Out of the 37 barangays, seventeen (17) barangays have recorded cases for CICL. The highest on the list is Barangay Poblacion West, with six minor offenders, equivalent to 14.6% of the total cases, followed by Barangay Buray and Barangay Trapiche, with five recorded cases, or 12.2%, respectively.

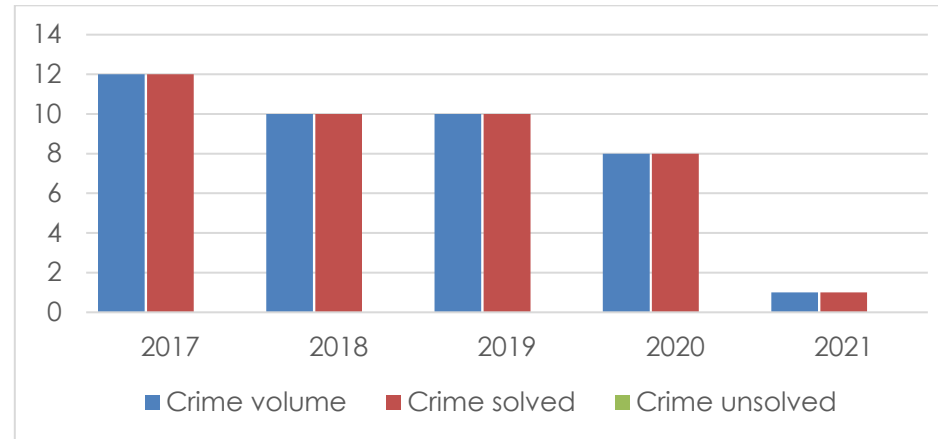

As shown in Table 42, the crime incidence from 2017 to 2021 totaled 1,069, of which 892, or 83.4%, were non-index crimes and 177, or 16.6%, were index crimes. Topping the list for index crimes is rape with 52 cases, followed by physical injury with 45 cases, and theft with 33 cases. Homicide recorded the lowest number with six cases. For the past five years, there has been a decrease in the crime incidence recorded for both adults and minors.

3.5.7.4 Fire-fighting Personnel and Facilities

As presented in **Table 43**, Oton Fire Station is located at Sitio Manue, Brgy. Tagbac Sur, occupying an area of 400 square meters. The fire station was constructed in 2020 on a municipal lot donated by the Local Government Unit of Oton. At present, it has two (2) serviceable fire trucks that respond to fire emergencies within the municipality and other neighboring towns and cities.

The Oton BFP manpower is composed of fifteen (15) personnel supervised by a fire marshal on administrative and operational functions. A fireman-to-population ratio of 1:6,567 shows inadequacy in terms of personnel based on the standard requirement of one (1) fireman for every two thousand (2,000) population. Aside from firefighting services, they are also involved in various disaster risk reduction and management programs of the municipality. They also conducted an information and education campaign for disaster preparedness and prevention, as well, as disaster response. Also, they were involved in business and building permitting services through the issuance of fire clearance certificates for those applying for business permits and building permits.

As part of their fire safety and prevention campaign, they implemented various programs and activities to enhance the fire safety awareness of the people in the community. In the year 2022, they were able to conduct a total of 248 fire safety inspections of buildings of different types of occupancy. They were also able to conduct fire safety lectures to a total of 26 establishments and had organized thirteen (3) barangay fire brigades and thirteen (13) company fire brigades.

Special activities were also conducted to further intensify fire safety awareness, such as the observance of Fire Prevention Month, Oplan Kaluluwa, and Oplan Iwas-Sunog, which are being undertaken with the support and cooperation of and in coordination with other agencies and stakeholders.

3.5.7.5 Fire Hydrants

With the escalating number of commercial and business establishments and the development of large portions of our land into residential subdivisions, the safety and security of people’s lives and properties from destructive fire are likewise being undermined. To address this concern, there is a need to upgrade and modernize the facilities and equipment of our local fire station to cope with the demands of our fast-growing economy.

Aside from two (2) unit firetrucks, there are a total of five (5) hydrants installed in this municipality. As reflected in **Table 44**, two (2) are located in Brgy. Poblacion West, one (1) in Poblacion East, and two (2) are in Brgy. Poblacion South. However, one of two in Brgy. Poblacion South is non-operational.

Considering the wide area covered by this municipality, there are barangays that are far away and could not be quickly accessed by the firefighting units. It is, therefore, vital to install fire hydrants in far-flung barangays to have an immediate-access source of water supply in case of fire emergencies.

3.5.7.6 Occurrence of Fire and Response Time

The fire incidents for the last five years have totaled ninety (90) cases, as presented in **Table 45**. Data shows that 2021 had the highest number of fire incidents with thirty (30) cases, while 2019 had the least number of recorded fire incidents with four (4) cases. For the past five years, Barangay Buray topped the list with eleven (11) recorded cases, followed by Barangay Lambuyao with eight (8) cases and Barangay Pakiad and Barangay Trapiche with seven (7) cases, respectively. Furthermore, the fire incidents that occurred were mostly due to electrical ignitions or short circuits with 48 recorded cases; open flame from cooking, kaingin, kerosene lamp, rubbish fire, and unattended lighted candle with 15 cases; ignition of materials from ember with 9 cases; smoking or lighted cigarettes with 6 cases; overheated engine with 3 cases; battery short circuit, children playing matchstick, intentional fire, and magnified or amplified sun rays with 2 cases each; and sparks from machinery with 1 case.

The frequency of fire occurrences for the last five years is presented in Table 45. For 2018, nine (9) fire incidences were recorded, four (4) in 2019, twenty-eight (28) in 2020, thirty (3) in 2021, and nineteen (19) in 2022.

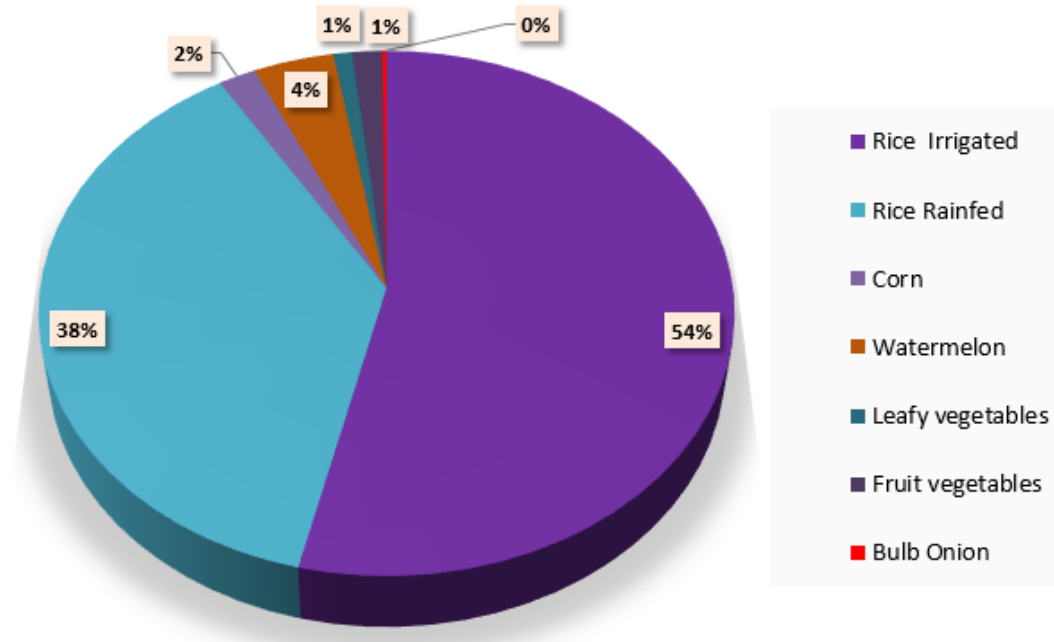

Table 46 shows the municipality existing major agricultural crops by area for the year 2021, which includes: rice, corn, watermelon, leafy vegetables, fruits (bearing and non-bearing) and bulb onion. Almost 75%-100% of these major crops areas are utilized for agricultural production. Rice production covers the largest area with 5,597.10 hectares or 61.69% of the total existing agricultural cropland, mostly irrigated with 59.8% or 3,293.21 hectares and the remaining is rainfed with 41.14% or 2,303.09 hectares. Annual rice production is 33,704,850 metric tons for two (2) cropping season, equivalent to P471,867,900. Aside from rice, watermelon is also a major crop of this town with annual production of 317,590.0 metric tons covering 251 hectares. Annual corn production reaches 147,000 metric tons with a peso equivalent of P14,291,563.00.

Oton is also a bulb onion producing town and one of the alternative crops being considered by farmers during the second cropping season, covering 13.53 hectares with annual production of 92,400 metric tons, equivalent to the market value of 3,696,000 pesos. Leafy and fruit vegetables are also one of the alternative crops being considered by farmers during the second cropping season. For the year 2021, the total land area planted with leafy vegetables is about 58.20 hectares with a total production of 686.90 metric tons with a value of P 17,172.50. Fruit vegetable has an area of 94.05 hectares with an annual production of 78,951.20 metric tons, equivalent to P5,526,584 pesos.

Graph 23 illustrate the major agricultural crops by area covered. With 61.69% of the total land area used for crops, or around 5,597.10 hectares, rice plantations occupy the largest amount of land, it is clear that the municipality is focused on the production of rice. Irrigated rice plantations and non-irrigated/rainfed rice lands make up the municipality's rice production. Watermelon production follows, occupying 4% of the total land area. Corn, Bulb Onion, Leafy and fruit vegetables also take up the least amount of land based on the percentage showed.

Table 47 presents the comparative agricultural crop areas and production for two consecutive years, from 2020-2021. It is prevalent that the total agricultural areas has increased by 96.18 hectares or 5.81%. Given the increase in some crop area, overall production volume likewise increased by 57,099.93 metric tons. Areas for rice crop have remained the same but the volume of production increases by 2,951.53 metric tons for 2 cropping season or 8.76%. The highest increase in corn area by 27.75 hectares or 23.57%, contribute also to the increase of volume of production to 17 metric tons or 11.56%. Aside from corn, watermelon also increased by 96 hectares or 38.25%. Its volume of production likewise increased by 75,590.03 metric tons or 23.80%. This prevalent increase is caused by favorable weather conditions that allow farmers to have a bountiful harvest during this period.

Leafy vegetables and fruit vegetables have decreased in their area of production, likewise in volume of production. Leafy vegetables decrease by 5.56 hectares and fruit vegetables decreases by 16.54 hectares. Bulb Onion, also decrease its area of production but the volume of production increased by 8,900 metric tons or 9.63% due to the good water and soil quality that favors the said crops. Leafy vegetables and fruit vegetables and Bulb onion have decreased in their area of production likewise in volume of production. For leafy vegetables decrease by 5.56 hectares and fruit vegetables decreases by 16.54 hectares while the bulb onion, although it decrease in area of production but still it increases its volume of production by 8,900 metric tons or 9.63%

4.1.2 Livestock and Poultry

4.1.2.1 Inventory of Livestock and Poultry Farms

To meet the demands of livestock farmers, the municipality maintains a "A" abattoir. This facility handles the slaughter of pigs, cattle, and carabao for use by the general population. But for now, this facility need repairs and rehabilitation. Another slaughter house proposed were located at Brgy. Lambuyao. This was a proposed project of PRDP.

The local livestock farmers are assisted by the Municipal Agricultural Office through programs for diagnosis, treatment, and deworming. Additionally, upgrading is handled in conjunction with the Philippine Carabao Center, which is situated in Calinog, Iloilo, and offers Artificial Insemination as one of its main initiatives. The PCC provides the Municipal Agriculture Office a semen of carabao and cattle for artificial insemination.

Livestock and Poultry raising is one of the major source of livelihood in the municipality. The total carabao registered reached 611 heads with 152,750 metric tons annual production equivalent to P12, 220, 000.00 market value. For the cattle, 274 heads registered with annual production of 419,000 metric tons with a market value of 41,910,000. The hogs has a total 4,591 heads registered with annual production of 459,100 metric tons and has a market value of 50,501,000.00 pesos.

4.1.3 Fisheries

4.1.3.1 Fishing Grounds and Aquaculture Production

The municipality is located along the seashore. It is composed of 6 coastal barangays: Alegre, Botong, Cabanbanan, Poblacion East, Poblacion South and Trapiche. It does not have a very productive fishing ground. In most cases fish catch is only good for daily consumption with an average production of 12.9 metric tons per year.

As of 2021, the municipality has identified twenty-five (25) existing and operating fish pond areas. A total of 24.23 hectares fishpond area were identified with annual production of 9.69 metric tons. These fishpond areas are all privately owned by residents who directly supply the local market. The primary produced of the said area includes tilapia and catfish. As shown in table 49 all areas are susceptible to flood. Moreover, most of the area are also dependent on rainy season for their water source.

4.1.3.3 Fisheries Technology

Technical assistance to fishpond operators and to recipients of freshwater tilapia. Lecture and demonstration regarding the post-harvest technology, reutilization of fish and fishery products and fish handling technology being imparted to fisherfolk.

Inadequate fish production in aquaculture due to polluted water from Iloilo River, insufficient water supply and not good weather condition. During summer season the water cannot be sustain resulting to drought within the fishpond area, and during rainy season too much water causes flood in the area, that is why fish farmer has only one (1) cropping season for fishpond area.

4.2 The Secondary Sector

4.2.1 Electricity, Gas and Water

4.2.1.1 Power Connections and Consumptions

The number of connections and average consumption of the municipality was classified as to the type of consumers from residential, commercial, industrial, institutional and others such as buildings/ facilities and street lights. For the past three years from 2019-2021, the total number of connections were 15,760, 15,984 and 16,274, respectively.

Based on the data reflected in Table 52, the total number of connections established in 2019 were 15,760 with a total consumption of 3,190.90 KW. Meanwhile, in 2020, total number of connections established was 15,984 with a total electrical consumption of 3,544.95 KW. In 2021, the total number of connections reached 16,274 which utilized 3,540 KW. For the past three years, an increase of 514 connections was noted which resulted to a 10% increase in total electrical consumption, majority of which belongs to the domestic/ residential consumers.

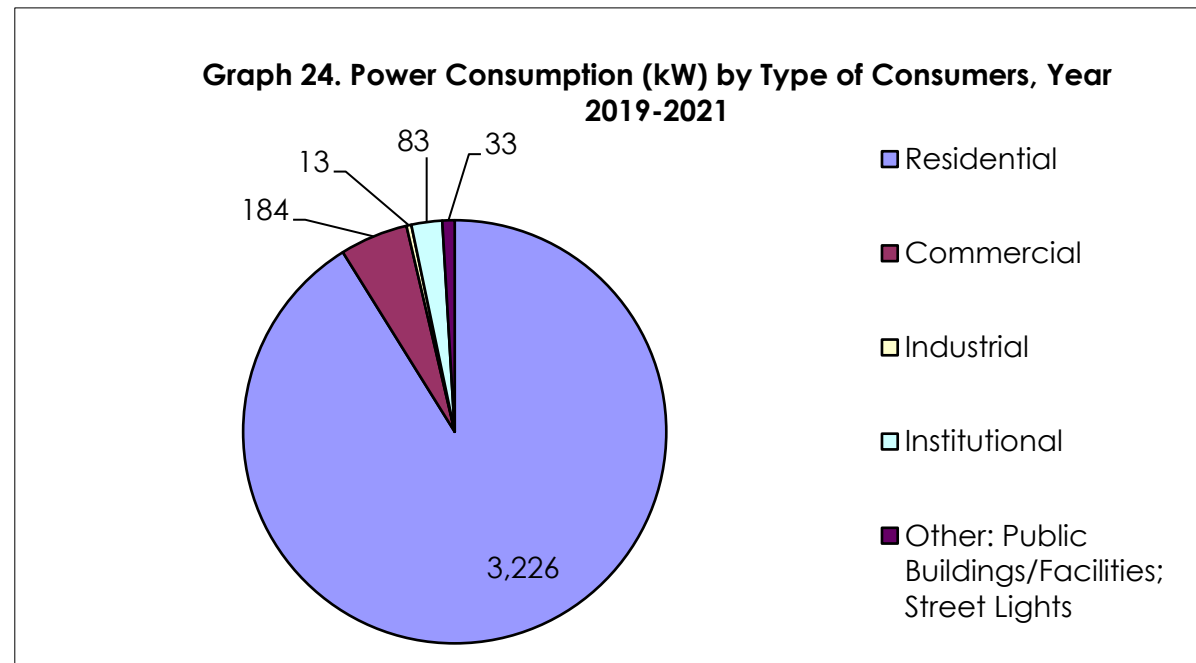
Moreover, the residential consumers constituted the highest number of connections established from 2019-2021 with 15,230, 15,466 and 15,902 which utilized a total electrical consumption of 3,190.90, 3,544.95 and 3,540, respectively.

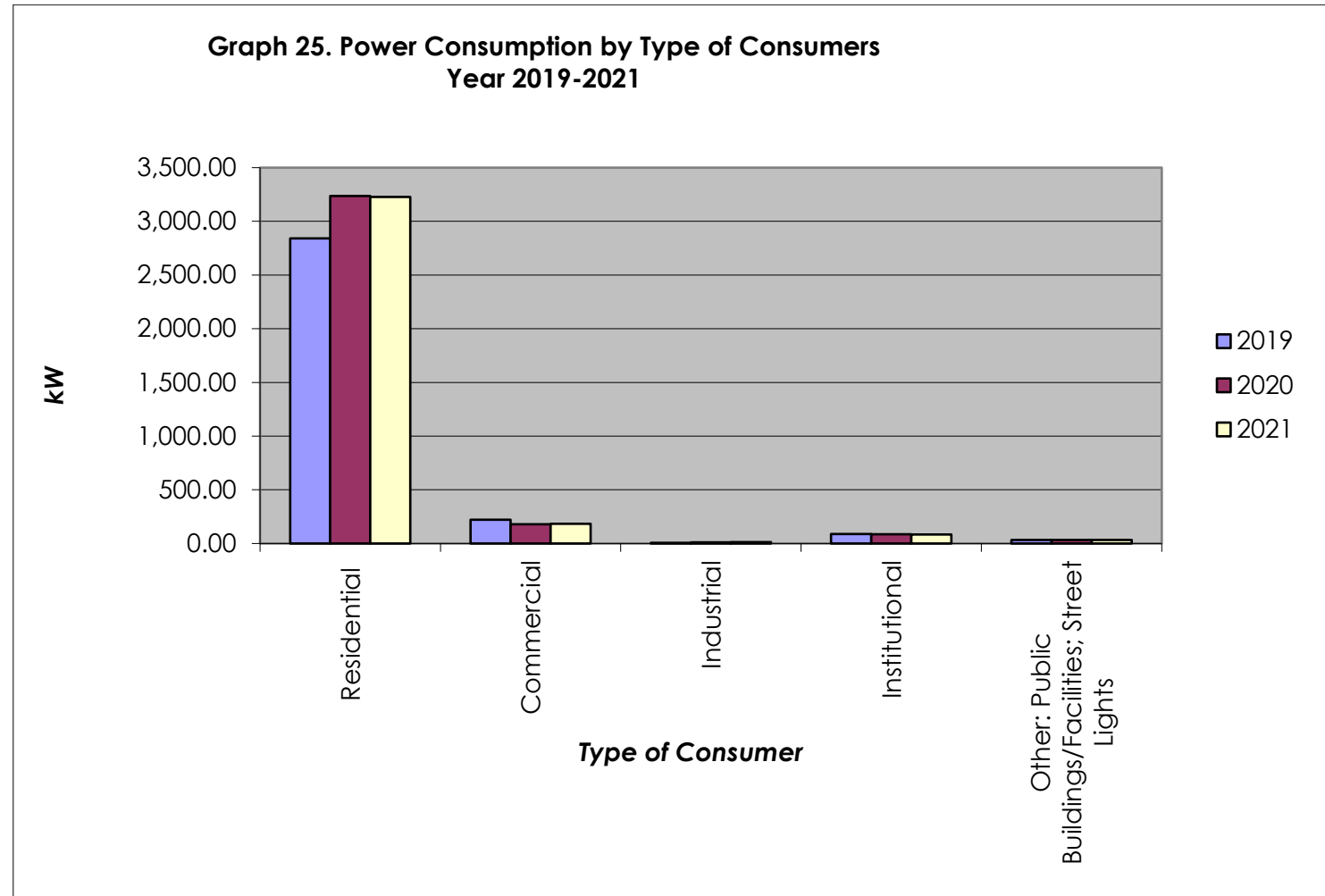

Graph 24 shows the average consumption of different consumers for the past three years, 2019-2021. The residential consumers have the highest electrical consumption at 3,226 KW, followed by commercial consumers at 184 KW, institutional consumers at 83 KW, other consumers (public buildings/ facilities, street lights) at 33 KW and industrial consumers at 13 KW.



As reflected in Graph 25, for the past three years, the residential consumers constituted the highest electrical consumption, followed by the commercial consumers, institutional consumers, other consumers (public buildings/ facilities; street lights) and industrial consumers.



At present, ILECO I has one power substation in Oton located at Brgy. Buray. The substation was constructed in 2017 with a voltage capacity of 13.2 KV. Based on the geohazard assessment, the power substation has a low susceptibility to flooding and not prone to landslide and storm surge.

4.3 The Tertiary Sector

4.3.1 Tourism Establishments

The inventory of tourism establishments in the municipality is presented in Table 54. As of 2021, there are fifty-two (52) tourism establishments listed in the Municipality of Oton. The tourism product and services are classified as follows: 1) Leisure and entertainment, 2) Sun & beach, 3) Meetings, Incentives, Conferencing, and Exhibitions (MICE).

The Leisure and Entertainment category include Sheridan Boutique Resort, Anhawan Resort, and dining establishments in the municipality. Since Oton is only thirty minutes away from Iloilo City, travelers who want to have a quick getaway would prefer to go to Oton. The bulk of visitors come during weekends and holidays. Most Leisure and entertainment facilities offer overnight accommodation and restaurants.

Oton is a coastal municipality with several resorts dotting its coastlines. There are six coastal barangays in the municipality, namely Alegre, Población East, Población South, Trapiche, Botong, and Cabanbanan. These barangays have numerous coastal resorts located in their vicinity. Some famous resorts in Oton include Anhawan Reort, Villa Azul Beach Resort, and Padi’s Beach Resort. On weekends, most of these resorts are filled to the capacity.

Oton is also a member of the Metro Iloilo-Guimaras Development Council (MIGEDC). The influx of guests in Iloilo City for Meetings, Incentives, Conferencing, and Exhibitions (MICE) has allowed Oton to cater to the spillover of guests from Iloilo City. Accommodation establishments like Topstar Hotel and Cecilles Pension House serves as the town’s main caterer for MICE guests.

4.3.1.1 Tourism Facilities and Existing Markets

The resort forms the bulk of the town’s Sun & Beach product and services.

4.3.1.4 Travel and Tours

Most of the gift shops and specialty shops are located within the Oton Public Market, situated at Poblacion South, Oton. 5.3 Water Supply

5.3.1 Level I

Level I water supply system (point source) refers to a protected well or a developed spring with an outlet but without distribution system, generally adaptable for rural areas where the houses are thinly scattered. A Level I facility normally serves around 15 households.

Based on the 2021 municipal data as reflected in Table IF-20, 76% of the total household population have access to Level I water supply system. There was a total of 10,140 deep wells situated in different barangays that provides water for domestic use to 17,010 households.

5.3.2 Level II

Level II water supply system (communal faucet system or standpost) refers to a system composed of a source, a reservoir, a piped distribution network and communal faucets, generally suitable for rural and urban fringe areas where houses are clustered densely to justify a simple piped system that usually serves 4 to 6 households. Aside from the deep well, there were also five (5) public faucets as source of water for domestic use as shown in Table 59 situated in Brgys. Alegre, Botong, Cabanbanan, Lambuyao and Tagbac Norte.

5.3.3 Level III

Level III water supply system (waterworks system or individual house connections) refers to a system with a source, a reservoir, a piped distribution network and household taps, generally suited for densely populated urban areas.

At present, Metro Pacific Iloilo Water, Inc. is the sole water utility provider in the Municipality serving sixteen (16) barangays. As shown in Table 61, the domestic connections composed of 2,616 households with an average water consumption of 276 m³. Meanwhile, the commercial consumers consist of 81 connections with an average water consumption of 492 m³ while the other consumers composed of government buildings has three (3) with an average water consumption of 376 m³.

5.7 Public Market

The Oton Public Market, built in the 1930s, is strategically located in the center of the town, which is typical of most markets established and developed during the Spanish period. This makes the enterprise very accessible to the whole population of Oton and the neighboring towns. Market buildings were added under the build- operate-and-transfer (BOT) scheme as per Municipal Ordinance No. 29 Series of 1994. Presently these buildings were already turned over/transferred to the Municipality of Oton.

Ten years later, in 2004, because of its positive experience with the previous BOT scheme, passed an ordinance adopting the Build-Operate-Transfer (BOT), Build-Lease-Transfer (BLT), and Rehabilitate-Operate-Transfer (ROT) agreements in the development of Oton Public Market. This was embodied in Ordinance No. 2004-124 and was later amended by Ordinance No. 2004-130.

The Oton Public Market caters, most and foremost, to the basic necessities of the majority of the population of the town. It is commonly referred to in the Philippines as a wet market, that is, markets that are associated with fresh foods, wet floors, and humid temperatures. Every day is market day in town but Mondays are special when more people, as usual, are going to the market. With a total number of households of 21,000 and most of the secondary schools located in the Poblacion or town proper, the number of people availing the services of tricycles going to and from the market is quite substantial.

Because of the volume of market goers in the town, the market attracts buyers of basic products and services. This gives rise to more entrepreneurs selling their products in the Poblacion; hence, the occupancy of the market stalls is quite high at 99.75%.

The immediate market of the rental stalls and leasehold rights are the entrepreneurs, offices, farmers and fishermen who bring their produce to the market.

Based on the data presented in Table 69, there are many vegetable vendors in the public market followed by rice retailers then drygoods stall owners. However, according to DTI and LGU monitoring, many stall owners are not accurate in declaring what goods they are selling. Many have products in their stalls that are not listed on their businesspermits. While the BPLO data shows only one store selling school supplies, the majority of dry goods stalls sell school supplies.

Figure 2. Local Government Unit of Oton Organizational Structure

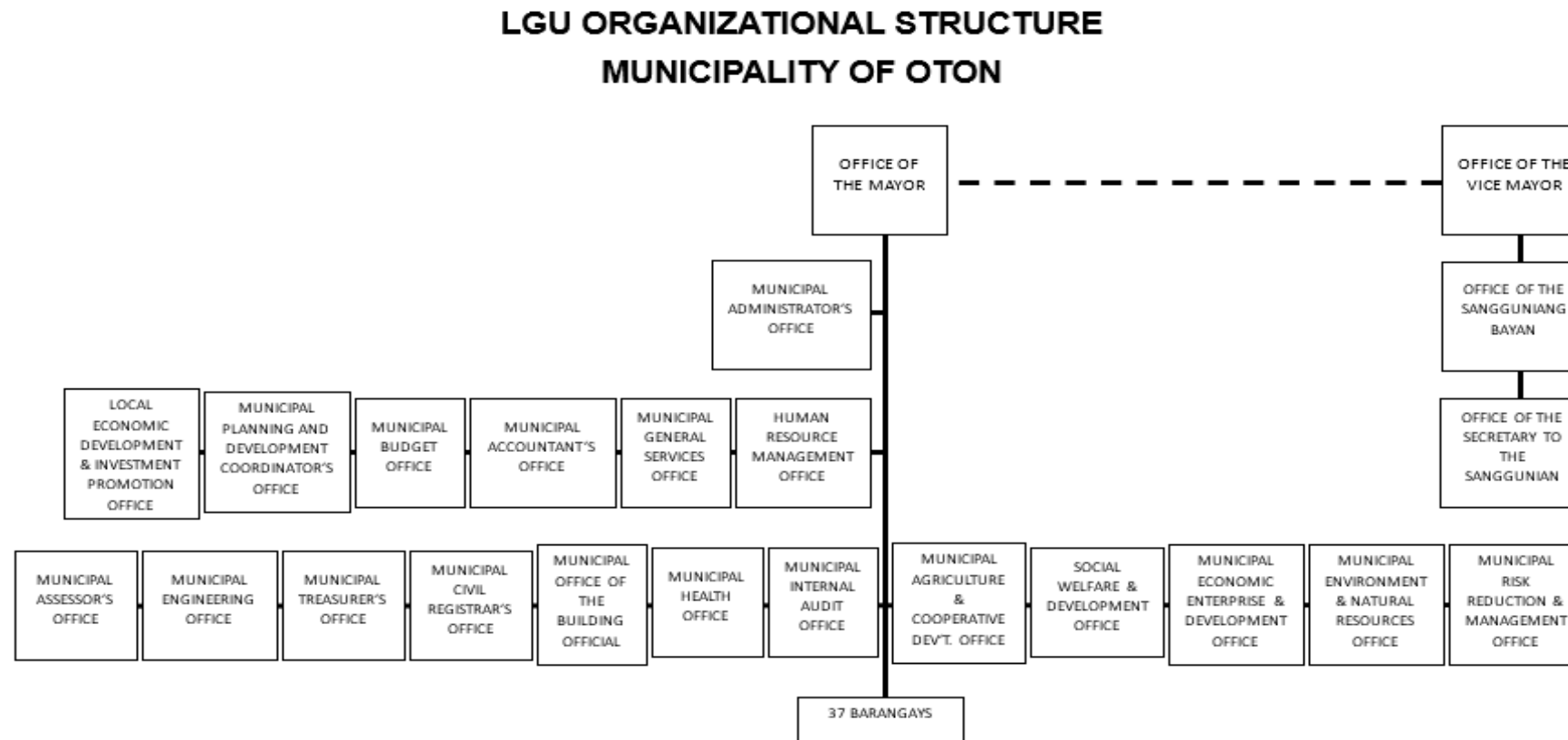

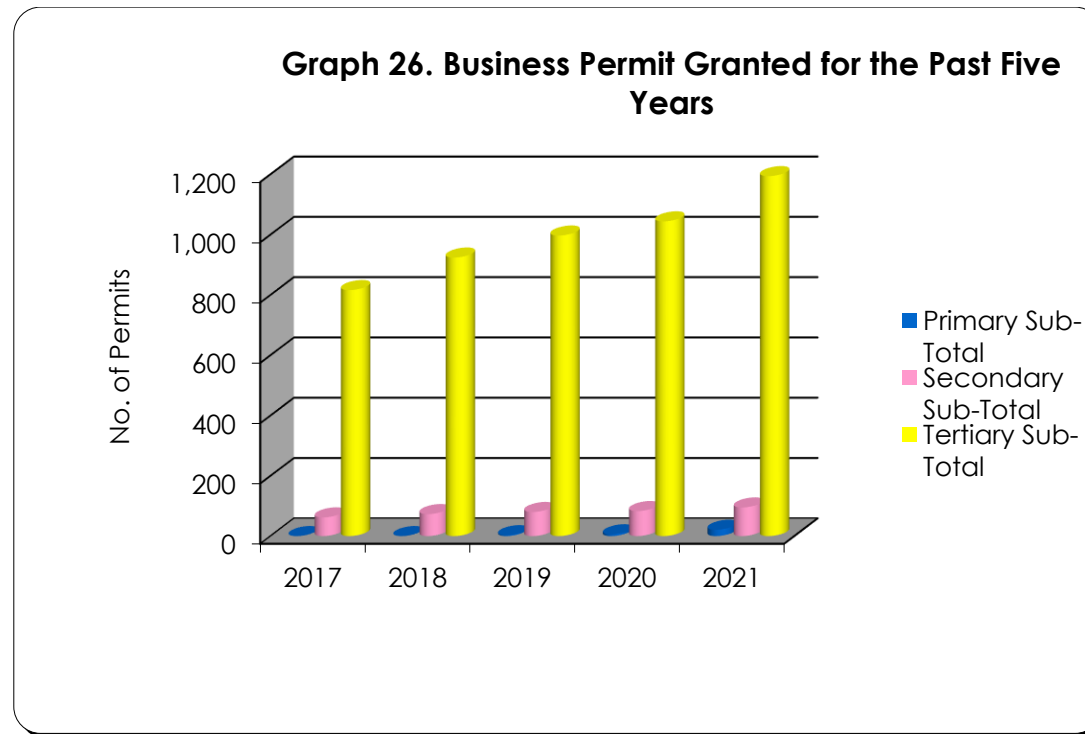
